C. P. S. Liner Coming from Scotland—S.S. Montcalm Due Thursday on Her Maiden Voyage.

Word was received at local headquarters for the Canadian Pacific Steamships Ltd., that the Tunisian liner will arrive from Liverpool, she is bringing passengers, general cargo and a small quantity of mail. Cases Heard In The Police Court

Evidence Heard in Liquor Charge Against George Galbraith—Joseph Axtell Pleads Guilty to Stealing.

In the police court yesterday morning, George Galbraith pleaded not guilty to a charge of having liquor in his possession other than in his private dwelling. Inspector Henderson told of going to the Empress Hotel in company with Inspector Killen and of seeing the accused and Ernest Piers at the head of the stairs. While waiting for the former to open the door, the witness saw Galbraith running into a back room with a pitcher in his hand. The witness said that he followed the man into the room, after having been obstructed by Piers, and there saw him raising out the pitcher. A strong smell of liquor was noticeable about the sink and in the pitcher, while two glasses were found on a nearby table. This article was taken in court and identified. The defendant asked leave to procure counsel and postponement was granted until today at 10 o'clock.

Father Held With His Daughter On Murder Charge

Resulted from Finding Body of New-Born Child in Snow Bank.

Sackville, Sask., Jan. 24.—As a result of the finding of the body of a new-born child in a snow bank, near Langham, Sask., last Saturday, George Kowalski, a farmer, and his 14 year old daughter, Lily, were today committed to stand trial on charges of murder. Physicians gave evidence that the infant was alive when born, and that the child had been killed by a blow on the head.
