Atlanta, Ga., On April 11, 1929 an arrangement was completed be tween Atlanta University, Morchouse College and Spelman College for the affiliation of these three institutions in a university plan, the graduate and profession al work to be carried on by Atlanta University, the college work to be done by Morehouse College and Spelman College. Dr. John Hope was invited to become President of Atlanta University.
