### Atlanta to Give Graduate Work

Atlanta, Ga.,—On April 11, 1929 an arrangement was completed be-  
tween Atlanta University, More-  
house College and Spelman Col-  
lege for the affiliation of these  
three institutions in a university  
plan, the graduate and profession-  
al work to be carried on by Atlan-  
ta University, the college work to  
be done by Morehouse College and  
Spelman College. Dr. John Hope  
was invited to become President of  
Atlanta University.

The arrangement contemplates  
an immediate change in the activ-  
ities of Atlanta University. No  
freshmen are to be admitted next  
fall, and as rapidly as the present  
undergraduate classes can be tak-  
en care of, the University is to be-  
come an institution for graduate  
and professional work only. It is  
expected that certain graduate  
courses will be offered during the  
coming academic year 1929-1930,  
but time will be taken to build up  
with care and with a definite eye  
the needs the graduate faculty and  
the graduate school.

### Henry Ford Visits Negro Church

DETROIT, Mich., April 11—  
By the Associated Negro Press—  
Henry Ford, auto magnate, and  
Mrs. Ford were present at the  
Easter Sunday morning services at  
St. Matthews Episcopal Church.  
The Fords were simply part of  
the audience and no effect at un-  
due publicity was made. Father  
Daniel preached the Easter ser-  
mon. This is the only colored ep-  
iscopal church in Detroit.
