He was extricated from a very perilous situation, lying under a heavy piece of timber, with a portion of the boiler above him. from the breakage of which in addition to his other injuries, he was severely scalded. Mr. Mc Ewen was cut in two, and his remains with those of his brotherin-law and the unfortunate young men, were trightfully mangled. What adds to the melancholy interest attending the circumstances of Mr. McEwen's death, is the fact stated that he had just sold out his interest in the mill, and if it had stood a day longer, would have been entirely disconnected with it, having disposed of his share of the business to a gentleman of Ottawa, who was actually on his way at the time to complete the bargain.

The excitement at the North Gower consequent on the disaster has naturally been very great. The Eastman family and connexions, long resident in the township, are numerous and respectable. Mr. W. Eastman leaves a small family. Mr. McEwen also comparatively young, leaves a widow and

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an appearance of the most appaling wreck. The building, except one end, is completely demolished. Huge pieces of timber are precipitated upon the ice in the river, at a distance of two or three acres, and fragments of the building are strewn about the fields in all directions. From the end of the building which is still standing, two or three persons who were in an upper story managed, after the explosion, to crawl down, and escaped with-

out injury. We have not learned whether the property was insured : nor do we hear that any inques has been held on the bodies of the unfortunate deceased. The omission we think culpable for accidents which endanger the lives of multitudes, and which are now constantly occurring, seldom happen without blame attaching in some quarter. Whether the accident originated in defective machinery, tor which the manufacturers are responsible, in carelessness on the part of those who were entrusted with its management, or in a deficiency of engineering skill, the truth should be known, and the most ample means taken to ascertain it by a thorough investigation. No mistaken lenity to the living, or tenderness to the memory of the dead, should be allowed to interfere with the prosecution of a full inquiry.
