A special train, leaving here at 7:45 p.m. Grand Trunk, will take London fans down to Woodstock for the sudden-death game between Ingersoll and London Alerts for the group honors.

There should be well over 500 fans so down. A special coach is being provided for the fans, and 200 reserve seats have been guaranteed by the Woodstock Arena management for the London fans.

As You Were

Tilsonburg fans and the team are extremely pleased at the result of Monday night's game. The Pan Drieds' publicity agent has the following to say, which shows more heat than good commonsense or knowledge of the hockey situation in London:

The Alerts have a harder job on their hands tonight than many they find in the semi-final games. They put Ingersoll out tonight. The two teams size up pretty evenly on the season's play, even the most rabid fans of each will admit, and attempting to dope out what will happen this evening at Woodstock would be a ticklish proceeding. London in the twice they've met the Ingersoll crew have outshot them two to one, most of the shooting being admitted of a wild and inaccurate nature, but a goodly margin was well-earned. The Alerts, too, were probably the worst off of the group with regard to the game this evening.

The Alert Club will take every precaution tonight to see that the rightful holders of reserved seats get what they paid for. Men will be stationed who will look after the London crowd, and see they get to their sections.

TOLEDO RAGER BREAKS WORLD'S RECORD IN 5-MILE DASH ON ICE

Time of Lawyer Swift Was 12:15 1-2—Neck-and-Neck Finish With Romala.

OTTAWA, Feb. 8.—Lawyer Swift, 2:09 1/4; the black pacer by Heir-at-Law, owned and driven by Harry Gray of Toledo, O., today won the five-mile dash, the feature event in the ice races here, in 12:15 1/2. This is claimed to be a world's record for the distance on ice. The Toledo horse beat out Romala, owned and driven by James Stewart of Los Angeles, Cal., in a neck-and-neck finish. There were five horses in the race.
