

Tillsonburg fans and the team are extremely pleased at the result of Monday night's game. The Pan Drieds' publicity agent has the following to say, which shows more heat than good commonsense or knowledge of the hockey situation in London:

Tillsonburg, Feb. 8.—During the past three months many Canadian sporting pages have commented on London not having a presentable ice arena for hockey, but if any of these same writers had witnessed the play-off in Ingersoll between London and Tillsonburg last evening it would leave no doubt in their minds why hockey finds poor support in the Forest City. With the score standing 1-0 in favor of the London team, the referee, who was a local, despite the fact that the London goaltender acknowledged it was a goal, Referee Jacob was in a difficult position, but he was close to the goal at the time and could make no mistake. The lamentable part of the affair was the fact that the goal referee and his associates had a lot of money on the game, and would use any means to win. The referee, who was the same deal by London last year at Ingersoll, and last night's game was a plain case of highway robbery. Deeply these facts the Tillsonburg boys will still continue to play, and will have if present plans go on and a decidedly enlarged rink for next season.

Suppressing of Time Is Mainly Discussed by Members.

TORONTO, Feb. 8.—Suppression of time, failure to close entries on dates announced, employment of unlicensed starters, and other lax methods were condemned at the annual meeting of the Canadian Trotting Association here today. The question of suppressing time in a race was discussed the most warmly, and instances were cited where horses were allowed to race in lower classes than they were entitled to as a result of their actual time in certain races being suppressed.

CANADIAN WINS HURDLE
RACE IN NEW YORK MEET

New York, Feb. 8.—Earl Thompson, the Canadian Olympic hurdler, and his laurels tonight at the annual indoor games of the Millrose Athletic Association in Madison Square Garden, by winning the 70-yards hurdles race in 9 seconds flat, Frank Loomis, Jun., of Chicago, was second.

Over the low hurdles, at the same distance, Thompson won, and equaled his own world's indoor record of 8 1-5 seconds.

ESTABLISHES NEW RECORD.

Cleveland, Feb. 8.—A new United States record for Class A competition was established by Charles Heddon of Dowagiac, Mich., when he made a run of 139 points in a match in which he defeated Dr. A. I. Brown of Cleveland, 306 to 75, in the national amateur 18.2 ball game tournament here today.

The former champion made his remarkable run in the 16th inning. Heddon had been leading, making his record along the short rail and without any long drives. By his perfect cushioned hitting he accumulated runs of 57 and 56. His average, 16 14-19, is the highest of the tournament.

Brown's high run was 12, and his average was 4 8-18.

The previous high run record was 135, and it also was held by Heddon. It was made in a tournament match in New York about seven years ago.
