Suppressing of Time Is Mainly Discussed by Members.

TORONTO, Feb. 8.—Suppression of time failure to close entries on dates announced, employment of unlicensed starters, and other lax methods were condemned at the annual meeting of the Canadian Trotting Association here today. The question of suppressing time in a race was discussed the most warmly, and instances were cited where horses were allowed to race in lower classes than they were entitled to as a result of their actual time in certain races being suppressed.

Former Controller Sam McBride of this city declared that this sort of thing was the greatest curse to racing, and that it was the only way to keep the game honest. He said that the association had had a successful year.
