but sometimes it is caused unintentionally, when a ball goes through a window, for example.

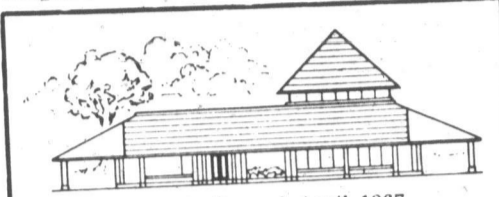
If parents stressed to their children the importance of being careful around school property it might well be that both taxpayers and the Board of Education would be pleased with the reduction in spending each

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF PORT CREDIT Notice of By-Law

Re: Closing Part of Maple Avenue South

TAKE NOTICE that The Corporation of the Town of Port Credit proposes to pass a by-law for the purpose of closing that portion of part of Maple Avenue South abandoned in street relocation more particularly described as follows:

ALL and Singular that certain parcel or tract of land situate, lying and being in the Town of Port Credit, County of Peel, Province of Ontario and being composed of Part of Maple Avenue according to a plan on file in the Registry Office for the said County of Peel as number H-22, which said parcel may be more particularly described as follows:

PREMISING that the south-easterly limit of Lakeshore Road has an astronomic bearing of North 38° 24' 30" East and relating all bearings herein thereto:

COMMENCING at the most Westerly angle of Lot 71:

THENCE South 51° 44' 20" East along the North-easterly limit of Maple Avenue, a distance of 130'-11" to the most Southerly angle of the said Lot 71;

THENCE North 70° 36' 50" West, a distance of 5'-0 1/2" to a point;

THENCE North 60° 20' 30" West, a distance of 127'-8" to a point in the said South-easterly limit of Lakeshore Road;

THENCE North 38° 24' 30" East along the last mentioned limit, a distance of 20'-8 3/4" more or less to the point of commencement.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that the Council shall hear in person or by his counsel, solicitor or agent any person who claims that his land will be prejudicially affected by the By-law and who applies to the Town Clerk on or before the 10th day of July, A.D. 1968 to be so heard.
