Vaughan distracted the man while Droy grabbed his arm and removed the knife. There were no in-


Election sign bylaw under fire

The election sign bylaw passed recently by Mississauga council discriminates against new candidates for council, says Don Wilson, who is running for the Ward 4 seat in the Nov. 13 civic election.

Wilson says the bylaw is unfair because it was drawn up and approved by incumbent councillors who did not have to conform to such a "restrictive" bylaw in previous elections.

"Elected councillors already enjoy a distinct advantage over aspiring candidates because of their prominent positions in the community," says Wilson.

"Placing restrictive barriers on how and where they can put their signs seems to suggest that the architect of such a bylaw would be out to protect his own self-interest.
