It was thought that in cases of groups of lads it would be better to have a General List Officer conduct the tour around the Station because they are potential aircrew and a General List Officer is more capable of answering their questions regarding flying. All 48 and 36 hour passes have been cancelled, except in very special circumstances, in order to insure a full attendance at the Drum Head Service to be held on the Parade Square at 1100 hours Sunday May 11th, 1941. Night flying was carried out by No. 2 Squadron until 0030 hours 11-5-41.	
	11-5-41		Sunday was a very bright day but cool and a strong wind blowing. The morning was entirely devoted to arrangements for the first Drum Head Service to be held on this Station. Roman Catholic Church Parade was held as usual at 1000 hours. The Protestant Church Parade was held on the Station Parade Ground in the nature of a Drum Head Service. Three Squadrons were formed up in a hollow square with the Drum Head Pulpit opposite the Saluting Base. Amplifier equipment was used so that the Service was easily heard by all personnel. The Parade was taken over by Squadron Leader W.R. MacBrien and handed over to the C.O. The Commanding Officer, Group Captain W.A. Curtis, read the Lesson. A large attendance of friends and relatives were present, numbering approximately 300. The R.C.A.F. Central Band was in attendance under Sergeant Major
