Brother. You know very well, & you must recollect that we had great trouble to take you out of that Country / Mohawk River / & brought you to former Canada.

Echo, Onondago Chief addressed the <sup>Sup.</sup> Superintendent General

Brother. The King, & the Officers who are sitting alongside of you, I hope will hear us. We thank you & are glad to find that you are well.

Brother. We have attended to what you have said on the subject of the existing dissension. We have frequently attempted a reconciliation between the Mohawks, who, it is true are the oldest Nation of the Union - but yet the Council Fire being kept at our Village, it is there, & there only that Councils should be held. We wish to reconcile the Mohawks to each other, & will meet their wishes if those who now have created the dissension would come forward, and confess their error.

Brother. We spoke to you last Fall at Fort George, & request of you again, to endeavour to have our Presents delivered to us at the Grand River. The Muskies which our young men receive here is too powerful for them. We are still in the hope of receiving the Presents at the Grand River, as every year approaches to us the place of delivery.

Brother. You have now finished the paying us our interest money. We conceive it to have been correctly paid.

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
