## The Mutual Life of Canada in War-Time



ALL POLICYHOLDERS entering the Canadian army whose policies were issued previous to enlistment were allowed to continue their protection without one dollar of extra premium for military service.

To the dependents and heirs of soldiers who have died on active service the company has paid not less than \$1,000,000, thus helping materially to relieve the situation both for the families bereaved and also the Government of the Dominion.

The winning of the war involved the expenditure of vast sums of money and in this connection the Company was able to play an important part in helping to finance the enormous outlay, by lending to the Dominion Government and our Allies the sum of \$6,276,600.

When the Influenza Epidemic swept over the country in the closing days of the war-time period, with its great toll of fatalities, the Company paid to beneficiaries upwards of three-quarters of a million dollars.

Thus it will be seen that during the trying period of the war our institution gave a magnificent demonstration of the great part played by life insurance institutions in the economic life of the country. That this feature is now appreciated as never before by the public at large is shown by the unprecedented expansion which the life insurance companies are enjoying at the present time.

Notwithstanding the immense sums distributed by the Company, as a result of the claims arising out of the war and the Influenza epidemic, its financial strength remains unimpeachable and policyholders will rejoice in the knowledge that in two of Canada's great crises they were able to befriend the sufferers in so large a measure and are better able than ever before to extend its benefits to an ever-widening circle of our Canadian citizens.
