The drawing for the handsome sweater which was on exhibition at China Hall, took place on Wednesday last, and was conducted by Sheriff Stuart.

The fortunate number was held by Mrs. J. Davidson Grimmer. The proceeds are for a patriotic purpose.

Rev. R. W. Ross, M. A., Halifax, preached two forceful and practical sermons in the Greenock Church last Sunday to large congregations.

Both men were convicted on their own confession and allowed to go on suspended sentence, after entering into bail to keep the peace for ten years.

The Act under which the proceedings were taken provides a penalty of five thousand dollars or five years' imprisonment, or both; and the offenders were made to understand that if caught about their former haunts during the next ten years they will receive a very severe punishment.

DEPARTURE OF THE PIONEERS On Tuesday afternoon's regular train a few of the 4th Overseas Pioneer Battalion left for Digby, where they will remain till they embark for overseas. On Wednesday at midnight a special train conveyed one half of the corps to St. John en route for Digby; and on Thursday night at the same hour the remainder of the Battalion left in the same way for the same destination. On Wednesday and Thursday nights the troops were given an enthusiastic send-off, as a token of the esteem in which they have been held by the townspeople and expressed of the best wishes of all for their future success.

While St. Andrews has manifest advantages as a site for a military camp, it also has its drawbacks, but one thing is certain, the people of the Town did all in their power to make the stay of the Pioneers a pleasant one, and we think their efforts in this direction have been highly appreciated by most of the officers and men. 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NEGOTIATIONS AT WASHINGTON CONCERNING CANADIAN FISHERIES

Ottawa, Aug. 28.—Sir Joseph Pope, Under Secretary of State for External Affairs, who was holidaying at an Atlantic resort, has proceeded to Washington, where he will meet W. A. Found, superintendent of Canadian Fisheries. Together they will confer with the United States Government in regard to the trouble which has developed on the Pacific coast in connexion with the halibut fisheries.

The proposed amendment to the revenue bill by which it is proposed to prohibit the shipment of fish in bond through Canada to the United States except from United States ports will be made the subject of representations by Sir Joseph and his associates. It is stated here that American fishing interests back of a proposal to establish a rival to Prince Rupert on the strip of American territory north of Prince Rupert, are responsible for the proposed amendment to the revenue bill, which has not yet, however, received the approval of the United States Senate.
