> Can be Operated Successfully in the Air

Unes up 2,000 Feet, Tacks and Steer Against the Wind-Also Makes a Safe Descent.

Friedrichshafen, Oct. 20.—Count von Zeppelin gave his airship another trial yesterday, and achieved a notable success. After rising, the airship remained poised at a height of 600 metres for three-quarters of an hour. It then made a series of tacks, an nour. It then made a series of tacks, and performed sundry turning manoeuves, after which it was steered against the wind. It finally headed toward Immenstadt, where the inventor landed after a trip that lasted about an hour.

The King and Queen of Wurtemberg witnessed the trial from the deck of a steermer.

steamer.

The airship carried four persons besides Court Zeppelin. When it rose the wind was from the north-east, blowing with a velocity of three and one-yards a second. When it had attained a height of 400 yards it described a circle and then dove with the wind in a generally circular direction for about six miles. In then again described a circle, after which it made headway against the wind, which was then blowing with increased velocity. Eventually the airship descended with great ease and steadiness into the lake, and was towed to a shid. The experiment was most successful.
