## WEEKLY MARKET REVIEW.

Planet Office, Tuesday evening, February 4.

Alt. John Waddell of the firm of J. B. Stringer & Co. gives The Planet the following quotations:

Small offerings of wheat and fair demand for flour keeps the grain in demand at last prices reported, 55c per bushel. The coarse grains have a better call to-day than a week ago, without much change in price. Receipts of corn very poor about suffering to meet demand.

Wheat—Oats are in light receipt and with only a quiet call for them. At 40 cents they can be moved for export, that is: Those that will inspect No. 2 white, street prices 52c to 54c for corn, and 38 to 39c for oats.

Barley has a light call at present, chiefly asked for shipment for export. Worth 50c per bu., when inspected No. 3 extra. Deliveries very small of late.

Beans—No demand—Deliveries not encouraged by dealers, consequently very moderate for the time of year. Immediate prospects not bright.

Dressed hogs—Since three weeks receipts very light, supposedly because grocers think of the crop is marketed, value lost some in past week in sympathy with decline on live stock. The street price is \$7.25, for best quality.

### OUTSIDE MARKETS.

#### HENRY CLEWS' REPORT.

Henry Clews, in his weekly report to The Planet, says:—  
The course of or foreign trade deserves attention. Apparently we have reached the zenith of abnormally favorable trade balances. Six times during the current year our exports have fallen below the same month last year. During September, October and November our exports declined continuously over \$25,000,000. On the other hand, our imports have been rising since April (the increase since then amounting to about \$50,000,000). This change in the current is highly significant, and is likely to continue with more or less irregularity in spite of the confidence with which we expect a good foreign demand for our breadstuffs. In November last our excess of exports was only \$64,000,000 against \$71,300,000 a year ago, and since January 1 our excess of exports amounted to but \$25,000,000 against \$271,600,000 same time last year. So far this year the gold movements show an excess of exports amounting to \$2,790,000 compared with \$9,630,000 excess of imports a year ago. The present tendency of the merchandise movement, therefore, is rather towards encouraging gold shipments; though, of course, the latter depend somewhat upon elements in the exchange markets not expressed in the trade statistics.

#### TORONTO PRODUCE.

Toronto, Feb. 4.—Butter—The butter market is unchanged. We quote:—  
Selected dairy, tubs, 17 to 17-1/2c; choice large rolls, 16 to 17c; finest 1-lb rolls, 15c to 20c; inferior quality, 10 to 12-1/2c, solids 20 to 21c. Creamery prints, 21 to 22c.

Eggs—The market is firm. Strictly fresh, 28c; held fresh, 25c, cold storage 20; limited 19 to 20c.

Cheese—Market is steady. We quote:—  
Finest, September, 10-3-4 to 11c; seconds, 9-3-4 to 10c.

#### HIDES, WOOL, TALLOW, ETC.

Toronto Feb. 4.—Hides—The market dull with prices easy.

Wool—The market for fleeces is quiet at 13c, and unwashed at 7c. Pulled wools sell at 15c for supers and at 18 to 19c for extras.

Tallow—Dealers are paying 5-1-2c for rendered, and 1-1-2 to 3c for rough. Small lots of rendered at 6c.

#### TORONTO GRAIN MARKET.

Toronto, Feb. 4.—Wheat—The market is quiet, red and white sold to-day at 74c, middle freights. Some hold-backers are asking a cent more. On the local call board No. 2 goose wheat sold at 68c middle on a low freight to New York. Spring wheat is quiet at 72c for No. 1, east. Manitoba is steady. No. 1 hard is quoted at 87c. No. 1 northern at 84c, selling to-day at that price, and No. 2 northern at 81c, g.i.t., Sarnia. On call 88c was asked and 86c bid for No. 1 hard, g.i.t., and 78c for No. 1, northern on spot North Bay.

Four—There was a fair inquiry and the market is steady to firm. Some 90 per cent patents sold to-day at \$2.90 in buyers' bags, middle freights. For choice brand prices are held 15c to 20 higher. Manitoba flour is steady at \$4.20 for cars of Hungarian patents and \$4.40 for strong bakers' sacks, included, Toronto.

Millfeed—Is steady at \$20 for shorts and \$18 for bran in bulk, middle freights. Manitoba millfeed is steady at \$22 for shorts and \$20 for bran, sacks included, Toronto, freights.

Barley—Is steady; No. 3 sold on call at 50c on a low freight to New York. No. 1 is nominal at 56c, No. 2 is quoted at 53c, and No. 3 extra, at 50c, middle freights.

Rye—Is unchanged at 50c east and 55 1-2c middle freights.

Corn—Is steady; on call to-day 55 1-2c, was bid for Canada, mixed and 50 1-4c, for yellow, with sellers of yellow at 57c west.

Oats—Are quiet at 40c to 41c, for No. 2, white, middle freights.

Outmeal—Is steady; No. 3 sold for cars of bags and \$5.40 for barrels, and 25c more for broken lots.

Peas—Are steady at 81c to 82c middle freights.
