OR NATIONALITIES.

ORIGIN AND NATIONALITIES OF THE PEOPLE OF THIS COUNTRY.

Among Whites the Racial or Tribal Origin Is Traced Through the Father, and Among Indiana Through the Mother-The Term "Canadian" Is Used to Denote Those Who Have Citizenship or a Home in the Country.

A bulletin issued the other day gives the census of Canada by origins and nationalities, grouped by provinces and territories. Among whites the racial or tribal origin is traced through the father and among Indians through the mother. A person whose father is English and whose mother is Scotch, Irish or French, is therefore classed as English in origin, but a person of mixed white and red blood, commonly known as a 'breed," is classed as Indian, with a sub-description of his white origin to denote the breed. The term "Canadian" is used as descriptive of every person whose home is in the country and who has acquired rights of citizenship in it. A person who was born in the United States or France or Germany, or other foreign coun-tries, but whose home is in Canada, and who is a naturalized citizen, is classed as a Canadian; so also is every person born in the United Kingdom or any of its colonies "whose residence in Canada is not merely Chas. Purity of Language.

The question of "purity of lan-quage" is a difficult one to discuss, for without doubt, the colloquial usof a language differs radically from the written and literary expression of a people. No one 'talks like a book" can be said to 'speak' good English; there is a picturesque carelessness of expression, a license in the use of adjecwhich marks the successful conversationalist. There are certainly words and phrases which are daily being born amid unique surroundings, which add strength and virility to the spoken language, which, when they become rooted in our literature, destroy its purity and style, simply because they are outcome of conditions which are transitory, and occupy no fixed place in the development of our people. Words even as ornamentation, they cease to express a certain fact, become superfluous and distort the language. What is meant by purity of language is lucidity, delicacy perception, an intuitive feeling for words. One can cultivate this by calling the attention of children to the aptness of expression, just as you may cultivate their musical ear appreciate the subtle shading of expression in the works of the great masters, or debase their musical taste by the twang of musical hall productions.—Lally Bernard, in The
