"Boys, I am ashamed of you. You, who pride yourselves on being Christians and appear inclined to look down upon those, who you have called in insult 'heathen.' Your conduct is a disgrace to yourselves and to your upbringing in a Christian community."

So said Judge Houston at police court this morning, addressing an octette of youths who were arraigned on the charge of annoying and assaulting Sam Lee, the Chinese laundryman and trespassing on his

property.

The lads ranged in age from 14 to 17 years, two announced their identification with the English church, two with the Catholic, two with the Methodist and one Resolverian and Bantist. each with the Presbyterian and Baptist Four gave their occupation as clerks, three claimed to go to school and one laid divided claim to that of studentship and news agency, being the deliverer of an intellectual load to city subscribers of The Planet

From the evidence it appeared that these young men invaded the premises of Sam Lee blew smoke from their cigarettes in his face, spat upon his floor, danced upon his furniture and performed other elevating antics to demonstrate their superiority over

Through his counsel, O. L. Lewis, Sam Lee asked his worship not to punish the boys. He only desired to enforce good be-

havior on their part.
