

PECULIAR RELIC.

Beautiful Carved Head of a Woman
to Tell of Ship Wrecked on
Hudson Bay Shores.

In a certain house in Fort Frances, Ont., there is an object which at once excites curiosity. The beautifully carved head of a woman, of Grecian mould, with gilded necklace and other ornaments unadorned, looks down wonderfully upon her strange surroundings. Last summer she lay upon the shores of Hudson Bay, and for two winters, storms and snows have drifted over her. Those who may find, in years to come, the decapitated body of the Figurehead Lady may wonder, indeed, over the peculiar sight. Three years ago the steamship Lady Head, founded on the Gasket Shoals, 150 miles north of Charlton Island. Last summer Mr. J. A. Osborne and a party of explorers came upon the figurehead of the wrecked vessel, in a perfect state of preservation. The body was garbed in flowing robes of a classical period. The find was a little too bulky to carry away entire, but Mr. Osborne could not resist the temptation to take away at least a part of it. Summary decapitation was accordingly decreed for the unfortunate lady, and her head now graces his den.

Mr. Osborne is editor and proprietor of The Fort Frances Times. From May to September he traveled 1,100 miles by canoe and portage north of the height of land. His party ran 42 rapids, and made 17 portages. At Moose Factory a boat was obtained and the adventurers sailed to Fort George and Great White River, the latter being the last Hudson Bay post on the east side of the bay. At this place there is only one white man.

The Eskimos Dying Off.
"From there," said Mr. Osborne to a Standard interviewer in Winnipeg, "we journeyed for 200 miles north, pushing our way through immense fields of ice, from the middle of July to the 1st of August, which made it extremely dangerous in winter. Finally driven ashore by the ice. At this point we found the remnants of the wreck of the Lady Head, which founded on the Gasket Shoals, 150 miles north of Charlton Islands, some three years ago. The pieces were picked up that have been found."

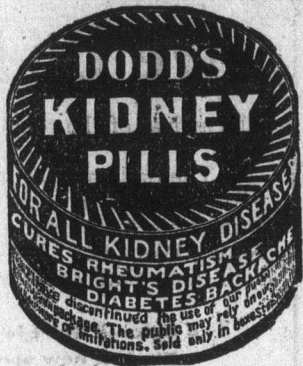
The Eskimos, Mr. Osborne states, are rapidly dying off or moving to Labrador, following the tracks of the reindeer, whose migration the late Leonidas Hubbard, Jr., of the ill-fated Hubbard-Wallace expedition, went up to see. Asked with regard to the much-talked-of question of the navigability of Hudson Bay, Mr. Osborne said that on the way up he met Captain Ford, of the H. B. Co.'s steamer "Discovery," at Charlton Island; who said he had been sailing the bay for 18 years, and he could see no reason why it should not be navigable for four or five months during each year without danger. Mr. Osborne himself believes that once Hudson Bay becomes a highway between the great West and the markets of the Old World, not only will the tide of immigration be turned direct to the West, but the bay, but it will be found to be an easy and inexpensive route to the east, both for passengers and freight, especially grain which will greatly reduce the cost of transportation as it exists in the West at present. In his opinion the Hudson Bay country itself will furnish a great deal of wealth to the Dominion. The fisheries have never been exploited. The bay is teeming with cod, whiting, salmon and speckled trout, while there is no doubt that the surrounding country is filled with great mineral possibilities. The southern and eastern portions of James Bay are heavily timbered with pine wood, which must be very valuable in a few years. As a game preserve, too, James Bay is a sportsman's paradise, it being the breeding ground of all sorts of wild fowl, such as ducks and geese, which throng its marshes in thousands.

Mr. Osborne said: "At Moose Factory I saw some of the finest gardens I have ever seen. I saw a lot of them. On some of the innumerable rivers crossed by the line of the G. T. P. there is water power sufficient to turn all the wheels in Canada. The country is well stocked with fuel, both in wood and coal. I myself found splendid samples of lignite in a number of different places. The climate is said to be mild in winter, owing to its proximity to the bay and its moderate sea level."

Mr. Osborne gave some interesting facts regarding the progress of Fort Frances. In connection with the power house, by the 1st of next January, 20,000 horse-power of energy will be available, of which a large portion is expected to be utilized in the near future for flour mills, pulp mills, woodworking factories, etc. Two railways are now building as rapidly as possible from the south end from Duluth and one from St. Paul.

To Walk Round the World.
Two young men, H. L. Tiffany of Delaware and W. G. Drayton, who reside at 79 Maple street, London, Ont., have announced their intention of starting out on a trip around the world on a wager, the stipulation being that they cover the 25,000 miles in one year and eleven months. The wager is for \$6,000, and as far as it is possible, they will walk the entire distance, carrying about 30 pounds of luggage and securing money only by the sale of picture post-cards. F. R. Thompson of New York, who makes the wager, is an enthusiast in globe-trotting, and lately offered the sum mentioned to anyone who completed the trip in the time stated, under an agreement that they were to start without a cent, and would not be allowed to represent any firm on their travels.

School Savings Banks.
The Victoria, B. C., Times states that the school savings bank system which was started in a tentative way in some of the classes of the Victoria Public Schools last October has proved a great success, and it is now to be extended to all but the primary classes. The Times thinks the movement supplies a most needed incentive to habits of thrift.



GENERAL BOOTH'S SCHEMES.

\$500,000 to Found Colony in England—Another in Rhodesia.

New York, March 6.—General William Booth, the aged leader of the Salvation Army, arrived in this city yesterday from London, and will remain two days as the guest of his daughter, Commander Eva Booth.

The General shows remarkable vigor for a man who on April 10th will celebrate the 78th anniversary of his birth. "I have three great schemes on hand," he declared. "First, I hope to complete my experiment of putting the people in possession of small land holdings—say, of five or six acres near market towns—where they can support themselves. I have one tract near Colchester, England, and have been given \$500,000 for the work there. "Next I have a great colonization scheme with Rhodesia, South Africa, as the location. We shall have a new world in the centre of South Africa. "My third scheme is to create two institutions, one in London and the other in New York, to teach suitable persons the proper way to deal with the vices, sins, misfortunes and miseries of mankind generally."

ABRAHAM'S TITLE DEED.

Sir William Ramsay Will Make New Search For It.

Sir William Ramsay will soon go to Asia Minor to undertake on a much greater scale than has hitherto been attempted investigations which are expected to throw much light on ancient history, especially Biblical history of the time of Abraham. Extended work is made possible by Lord Strathcona's gift of \$2,500 a year for five years.

Sir William in speaking of his expectations says he has been convinced for a long time and now thinks it will be practically demonstrated by the next great series of discoveries, that Aryan history had its beginnings in Asia Minor, and that the people among whom they are to be discovered were the people called the Hittites in the Bible, or the children of Heth, from whom Abraham bought a piece of land to make a grave for his family.

Sir William says: "I shall not be satisfied until the document recording the sale of that piece of land is discovered. It would be a clay tablet, but would be practically imperishable, and there are thousands of these tablets recording sales of that kind."

"There is not the slightest doubt that the sale of that property was registered at the time and doubtless deposited in some Hittite temple for preservation. I cannot tell where it would be deposited, but those tablets constituted title deeds to property. Abraham in a strange land had to have proof of his purchase in a safe place, showing that he was the legal owner, and the only safe place at that time was a temple."

"Now those Hittites had an empire extending from the Aegean Sea to the borders of Egypt. It included the whole of Asia Minor and Syria. Their capital was in the northern part of Asia Minor, and its modern name is Boghazkelen. We know the sites of several of their great cities in Asia Minor. The duty of the future is to dig up those cities."

Sunday In England.

One of the most remarkable documents in modern times has just been issued in England in the form of a message to the nation signed by the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Westminster and the President of the National Council of the Evangelical Free Churches. The message urges upon all people the importance of adequate and reasonable Sunday observance. The Times in a long editorial reviews the subject, and points out that by the efforts of Lord Avebury and others the blessings of one day's rest in seven will be extended in England much further than at present. It also refers to the great advance made in regard to Sunday rest in France under the new law, and thus concludes: "To call it a problem has become, indeed, misleading. It is no longer a problem, but a received opinion that work—above all our modern work under high pressure—is impossible for man unless he is allowed at least one day in seven to rest his mind and body."

Saskatchewan's University.

Regina, Sask., March 8.—The University act, introduced by the Provincial Government for the purpose of establishing and incorporating a university, which has received its first reading, establishes a body politic and corporate consisting of a chancellor, a convocation, senate, board of governors and council.

Is to have equal power and authority to give such instruction and teaching as may be determined by the senate and to examine candidates for degrees and for conferrals of honor and to grant degrees after examination in the manner provided in the act.

No religious tests will be required of either professors or students, though the right is given to any affiliated college to make such provisions in regard to religious instructions and worship for its own students as it may deem proper.

The maintenance of the university is to be provided out of the general revenues of the province, and by a percentage of the net receipts of the province for the current year under the succession duties ordinance, and of the fund collected by the Supplementary Act.

The real and personal property of the university is to be exempted from taxation.

SPRING NECKWEAR.

New Styles Easily Copied by the Clever Needlewoman.

If the prevailing styles in neckwear had been expressly designed for the benefit of the woman who makes these small frivolities for herself they could not have suited her better. The season shows a marked preference for combinations over a single form of trimming used exclusively, and there is hardly an end of lace or embroidery left over from a dress, a shirt waist or even a fine bit of lingerie that will not come into play in skillful fingers, while fine hand work embellishes everything.

Even the stiff brim collars show hand embroidery. Even the cowbunny laces which are lavished on the dressier forms of neckwear are embroidered.

A charming stock that admirably illustrates the prevailing trend in fancy neck garnitures is built on a foundation of tucked chiffon. It is cut with a long tab that hangs down quite over the front of the bodice and is decorated with pieces of lace shirred on down the center, with a lace medallion to cover the shirrings. The stock itself is boned and is finished off with turn-overs of chiffon. At each point is placed a small lace medallion.

Fine valenciennes lace, eyelet work and French embroidery combine to make a linen collar a work of art, and it illustrates capably the passion for combination. This collar has a tab of finely plaited Persian lawn, the center of which is embellished with embroidered leaves and eyelets, while the outer edge is finished off with a row of the finest val. The edge of the collar proper is buttonholed in tiny scallops.

Collars of this description are worn mostly with tailor made blouses. Some of them emphasize the note of tailored severity by having the lawn of which they are built made up into a little bow, with just the ends trimmed with val edging.

As for the "dressy" stocks, they are nearly all made either of mousseline de sole or chiffon. Chiffon is without

doubt the most perishable of all materials for such a purpose, but it is by far the prettiest, besides being such a soft, pliable fabric that one can do all manner of things with it.

An extremely pretty effect is produced where the chiffon is tied in one bow and two ends, one of which should be much longer than the other. The ends are trimmed with insertion and match, then pressed into tiny plaits. The upright part of the collar is very simple, with just a row of lace at top and bottom.

Exceedingly dainty, too, is a collar and cuff set made of two different laces joined with fagoting. The collar, made on a bias band of lawn, has six points—two on the back and two on each side of the front.

Sweet Potato Pie Without Eggs.

This is the Baltimore way of making sweet potato pie, and very good it is: Peel and cut in quarter inch slices a quart of sweet potatoes. Cook until tender with one pint of very strong ginger tea, a generous cup of butter, three cups of sugar and plenty of lemon peel. Stew gently, so that the slices will not break. Line a deep pie plate with a rather thick crust, fill with the potatoes and their syrup to within an inch of the top, then cover with a crust with a cross cut in the center.

Turn back each corner of the crust and bake with a moderate heat until the pastry is done. Ten minutes before serving pour through the hole in the top a wine sauce made by creaming together one cup butter, two cups sugar and the juice of a lemon beaten in a little at a time. Set the mixture over a boiling water and beat in gradually one cup sweet wine. Stir vigorously to prevent the butter separating from the rest of the ingredients.

COLONIAL RECIPROCITY.

Chambers of Commerce Ask For Favorable Negotiations.

London, March 8.—At yesterday's session of the Associated Chambers of Commerce of the United Kingdom, which are holding their annual meeting here, a resolution was adopted, asking the Government to conduct negotiations at the forthcoming colonial conference with the object of promoting reciprocal trading within the British Empire.

Robert H. Roade of Belfast, president of the Chamber of Commerce of that city, who moved the resolution, contended that the colonies were denied preferential treatment, and that if this was further refused they would look elsewhere for better treatment, and Canada, in particular, would seek for reciprocity with the United States, thus leading to the disintegration of the Empire.
