## MEDALS WERE PRESENTED

A Well Attended Concert Given in McKeough School - Prize Winners

H. S. CLEMENTS' ADDRESS

The annual distribution of prizes and medals took place last evening in McKeough school. A large throng of children and their parents were present, and the lower assembly room where the program was carried out, was crowded to the doors.

Trustee W. C. McArthur ably filled the position of chairman. In his opening remarks Mr. McArthur said that he felt honored in being asked to preside over such an important event—it was a position of which anyone might feel justly proud.

Chatham, said Mr. McArthur, had two of the best appearing and best equipped Public schools in the Province of Ontario, and he thought that McKeough school was not by any means the lesser of the two. Both schools were very fortunate in having such an efficient staff of teachers. The parents of Chatham could rest assured that while their children were at the local institutions of education, their morals and their intellectual betterment were being well looked after by competent and conscientious persons.

Mr. McArthur also made passing reference to the improvements which had this year been made at McKeough school, all of which he said were useful and a credit to the school. In connection with this, on behalf of the McKeough school managers, he wished to thank Trustees Paxton and Robertson for the very kindly assistance they had rendered during the time that the work was in progress. There had been some complaint he inferred, with regard to the cost of the work, but with regard to any extra work that had been ordered, he had no apology to make. The school was now one of the most up-to-date in the country.

At the conclusion of the chairman's address, a selection was rendered by a quartette composed of Messrs. Ross and Brackin, and Messrs. Coatsworth and Brackin. The selection was much appreciated.

The T. A. Smith prizes for the best flower growing by pupils of the school, were presented by Mr. McArthur.

Arthur. The first prize, a silver papkin ring, went to Miss Ada Daniel; the second, a silver salt and pepper set to Master Gordon Lang; and the third a push work-box, to Miss Lucy Trot.

Those fortunate enough to be present last night were next favored with a recitation by Miss Verlyn Lamont. This talented Maple City young lady was last night at her best, and her dual impersonation of a little boy and his mother visiting a museum was simply marvellous.

Miss Lamont took the audience by storm, and she well deserved every gesture of applause. Her facial expressions were so realistic as to be termed perfect—or so near to perfect that there was no room left for criticism. Miss Lamont is fast winning a name for herself as a very clever impersonator.

The McKeough medals, then presented by Mr. R. L. Brackin. These prizes consisted of valuable books, which were won in order of merit as follows: Miss Fay Anderson, Master Robert Brunker, Miss Mary McRobb, and Miss W. Arnold.

A solo was next rendered by Miss Olive Richards. Miss Richards was in fine voice, and she received a flattering round of applause.

It fell to the lot of Mr. Herbert S. Clements, M. P., to present the McKeough medals, donated for excellence of work by Mrs. McKeough, Sr. It was a great pleasure, said Mr. Clements, who bowed gracefully to continued applause, to be honored with the task of presenting the McKeough medals, which were associated with all that stood for the good and betterment of educational matters in Chatham. He made touching reference to the nob's work of the late lamented William McKeough, and he paid high tribute to Dr. McKeough, the ex-Chairman of the Public School Board, whom he said took an interest in school matters that commanded the profound admiration of all. He said that it was to be hoped that Dr. McKeough would not think for one moment of relinquishing his position as a member of the educational government of Chatham, and if he saw fit to again tender himself as a candidate, he was sure that he would be elected by an overwhelming majority. Mr. Clements also congratulated the managers of McKeough school on the excellent results of their services on the Board, which was everywhere in evidence about the school.

In conclusion, Mr. Clements made a few remarks on patriotism, which he said should be carefully inculcated in the child's mind while at school. He was of the opinion that the national emblem should fly from every school in the Dominion every day in the year. It would have the effect of keeping the vastness and greatness of the Empire always before the children's minds.

Mr. Clements then presented the McKeough medals to the following prize winners: Master Douglas Bell, and Misses Lia Joorey, Ada Daniels, Margaret Bowers, Doris Harwood, Irene Johnson, Dorothy Arnold and Jennie Matthews.

After the donation of the prizes, a very acceptable solo was rendered by Mr. Kenneth Coatsworth.

Mr. F. B. Stevens presented the champion athlete medal to Master Roland Rumble, the winner of this coveted prize. Mr. Stevens made a very interesting and witty speech while making the presentation, and gave out a few words of sound advice to the children present.
