TARIFF ON SUGAR

David A. Gordon, M. P., Says Government Will be Asked to Make Present Duty a Minimum

Mr. David A. Gordon, M. P., Wallaceburg, recently presented to the Tariff Commission a strong protest against the reduction of the protective duty on beet sugar under the preferential tariff.

"The preferential tariff by the Dominion Government practically annuls the bounty given by the Provincial Legislature," said Mr. Gordon. "The sugar manufacturers will ask the Government to make the old tariff a minimum. We do not ask a Chinese wall, but at the present time the duty on sugar is not twenty per cent, while the American tariff is four times as high."

"The farmers of Kent and the western peninsula are equally interested in securing a reasonable amount of protection and have made strong representation to the Commission. Sugar beet growing they have found to be their most profitable crop. Then, again, the removal of the duty on sugar, which is a staple commodity, necessarily means an increase for revenue purposes elsewhere."

"The three Canadian factories at Alberta, Berlin and Wallaceburg produced twenty-five million pounds of sugar last year. This is valued at four cents per pound, and the maintenance and encouragement of these factories will easily mean the keeping in the country of \$1,000,000 per annum which would otherwise be sent abroad."

the agreement is fulfilled to the letter.

As for the \$35,000 going to the creditors of the present line, does not the By-law give the money for this purpose? The company did not force their way over the heads of them and, as Mr. Kizer says, are still willing to act fairly, but they cannot go on until these matters are adjusted, and if the city desires to see this line extended or other lines entered they will only obtain it by co-operation.

I wish to add that I am not giving these views as manager of the railway, but as an interested citizen and stockholder, but as I know that the majority of the bond holders are unanimous in their decision as stated by Mr. Kizer, it is only fair that the public should know facts.

What the citizens wanted when voting in 1901 was an electric railway, which has been built without graft, with the addition of the first Steam Heat Plant in Canada. All is the result of a few of us inducing capital to enter our city by making promises we are now unable to fulfill, although the intentions of the citizens when passing the By-law No. 815, was, as stated by me, but having obtained the line as how in operation the opinion appears to prevail that the rest will follow, which, I am at liberty to say, will not be the case unless some other parties finance and build it. It would be unfortunate if this line should pass into the hands of one of the larger lines, such as the G. T. R. or C. P. R., and the city be in the position they were after the Erie & Huron passed into foreign hands, when it is admitted that the service was not as efficient as it was under the E. & H. management.

I am reminded in this case of what was said by one of the great actors of the day, "If you cannot boost don't knock."

That it illy behooves any of us, to deal harshly with any of the rest of us.

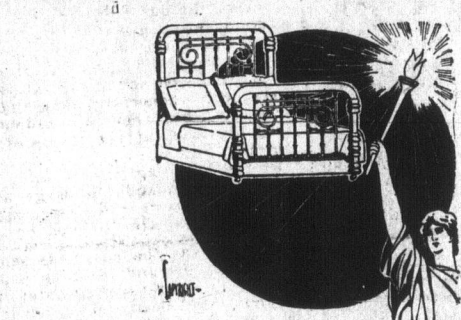
