Mr. Robt D. Eaton, Canning, recently returned from Boston, where he accompanied his wife, who went there for treatment. By examination under the X-rays by experts or specialists in Boston, her case as diagnosed by Dr. J. W. Miller under the X-ray at Canning, was confirmed. Mrs. Eaton remains, and later on operation will be necessary.

After twenty-nine years of active connection with the banking business in Halifax, Mr. W. C. Harvey, Inspector of the Royal Bank of Canada, has retired from active financial work to offer his services to the Empire in any capacity in which he can be of service. Mr. Harvey is well known in Wolfville, having organized the branch of the Union Bank (now the Royal) in this town many years ago.

Blenkhorn is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Loran Blenkhorn, of Canning, and a nephew of Mr. C. A. Patriquin, of this town.

A disastrous fire occurred at Port Williams at an early hour on Thursday morning when the barn and stable of Mr. George Gates was totally consumed with its contents including fifteen horses. One of them was a stallion worth \$1000, which was insured for about half that amount. The loss is a very heavy one and Mr. Gates has the sympathy of many friends. The alarm was given in town and our fire laddies went over to assist but the fire had made much progress when it was discovered that little could be done.

Pte. Vaughan Henshaw, of the 26th Batt., who was severely wounded in France, arrived in Wolfville on Thursday evening of last week. After spending several months in hospitals in England where his case was at first considered hopeless, he was finally discharged and is now well on the road to recovery. His many Wolfville friends are congratulating him on his narrow escape. Pte. Henshaw has declined to be retired from the service and hopes before many months to be back in the fighting line.

Another Open Letter.

I. B. Oakes, Esq. DEAR SIR:—My open letter was to the Liberal Association. You have answered it personally, and I will reply to your letter in the same way. In writing to the Association I consider that I was quite within my rights in addressing the president. You think I should have addressed the secretary. Difference of opinion, that is all.

Reading between the lines, in the resolution referred to, was not my dismissal included, when but representatives were commended for the appointment of additional magistrates? Was not the endorsement of our representatives by the Association in having me dismissed the purpose of this resolution? By whom was this resolution prepared? Where was it prepared? Do you think that I am too sensitive in this matter? Are you surprised when I tell you that every time a new batch of magistrates for the county is made that the knife-wound referred to in my letter is reopened? These men are all of them, with many others previously appointed, fit and proper persons to hold magistrates' commissions, but I am not competent.

Do you know that it is a very unusual thing to take a magistrate's commission from one? I must have done something terribly bad! What was it?

This resolution was based on the assumption that the illicit sale of liquor in the county has been very much lessened by my dismissal and the appointment of additional magistrates, or the foundation crumbles, the whole structure falls to the ground. Is this assumption true or false? I leave it for those who know the state of temperance matters in the county to say.

In closing I will ask you Dr. Oakes if you personally approve of the action of our representatives in insisting upon having my commission taken from me, without an investigation which was asked for?

Rev. R. F. Dixon on Sunday morning last at the conclusion of his sermon referred to the late C. H. Borden in the following words: "Since we assembled here last Sunday one of our regular worshippers has passed with in the veil, and his familiar face and form will no longer be seen in his accustomed place. For over sixteen years he has been a member of this congregation and for some twelve years a communicant.

An old and valued personal friend and neighbor his sudden departure will create a blank in my life, and that of many others which will not soon be filled. In the community at large he will be greatly missed, for though a man of retiring disposition so far as public business was concerned, his long residence here and his upright character and honorable dealing had made him one of our most influential citizens. Few if any residents of this town will be more generally missed and mourned than Clarence Hibbert Borden. He has gone beyond our earthly vision and yet his remains knit together with us in our communion and fellowship in the mystical badge of Jesus Christ our Lord. May light and joy and peace be his in the new life into which he has entered."
