THE PROVINCIAL CONVENTION OF THE W. C. T. U. OPENED

First Business Meeting of Fourth Annual N. B. and P. E. I. Convention Today

DELEGATES WILL BE WELCOMED TONIGHT

Reports on Sailors Work and Hygiene and Heredity Departments Submitted Today

The fourth convention of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Women's Christian Union opened this morning in the Brunswick Street Baptist Church, a meeting of the executive having been held last evening, at which details for the convention were arranged. Mrs. Gray, widow of the late Dr. Gray, of Fairville, occupied the chair as provincial president, and there were about forty delegates present.

Following devotional exercises and roll call, Mrs. Hanson, of Saint John, gave her report as Superintendent of Sailors' Work, which includes not only the practical help to the seamen sailing from the provincial ports, but also the fishermen of the Dr. Grenfell mission on the coast of Labrador. During the past year, the following gifts were contributed: 48 comfort bags, 7 barrels of clothing, \$40 in cash and 50,000 pages of literature.

Mrs. McAvity, of St. John, gave the report on Hygiene and Heredity. The best message in regard to this department came from Stammerside, P. E. I. There the local Union was very much alive to the necessity of rescuing the rising generation from the evils of cigarettes. Millerton, N. B., was a close second in the work, while other unions are more or less active. In the discussion that followed Mrs. (Dr.) Sprague of Sackville emphasized the necessity of teaching Hygiene in the home, and the profound need of an educated motherhood.

The morning session closed with a helpful Bible reading by Mrs. Katherine L. Stephenson, of Boston, the all around the World's W. C. T. U. missionary. This afternoon another business meeting is being held and there will be a public meeting tonight, when the delegates will be welcomed.

GAME LAW CHANGES.

Shooting of Game Birds Will Not Commence This Year Until September 15th.

The new copies of the game laws of the province, which are now being distributed, contain a few amendments of interest to sportsmen.

The open season for woodcock will not commence until September 15th, instead of the first, and then sale is prohibited.

The restriction of the number of birds which can be shot in any one day is also important.

Section 62 is amended by providing that an unnaturalized foreign-born resident of the province is required to pay a fee of \$25 per year for a license "to deal in, buy, tan, cure and sell the hides or skins of game and fur bearing animals," and that such license does not authorize any agent of the license to exercise the rights and privileges thereby granted.

The Surveyor General has issued the following summary of the regulations:

1. The use of sink boxes, so called, in shooting geese or brant is restricted to the hours between daylight and twelve o'clock noon each day during the hunting season, and the same can only be used by a person having a license therefor issued by the Surveyor General. The person obtaining such license shall use one sink box only, and shall have his name and the number of his license displayed in plain sight on the box. Immediately after twelve o'clock noon each day the owner of such sink box shall remove the same from the shooting ground or sink it out of sight; any sink box not licensed shall be destroyed by any Game Warden or other person finding the same, and any box licensed and left on the ground after the hours herein named may also be destroyed by any Game Warden or other person finding the same. The chasing of geese, brant or ducks by power, sail or other boats, to cause them to fly or drive them away from their feeding grounds is strictly prohibited. The fee for the license above herein mentioned shall be \$1 per year.

2. Notwithstanding anything contained in "The Game Act, 1909," and amending Act, it shall be lawful for the residents of the parish of Grand Manan, in the county of Charlotte, to shoot black duck within the boundaries of said parish between the first day of October in any year and the first day of March in the next following year.

3. That the limit under the Game Act for duck shooting shall be twenty birds per gun per day.

4. That the limit under the Game Act for partridges and woodcock respectively shall be ten birds per gun per day, and that no other means of killing partridges and woodcock shall be allowed except by shooting.

5. The sale of woodcock is prohibited between the date of this regulation and the 15th day of September, A. D. 1912.

NO CONTESTS IN FOUR PARISHES AND PERHAPS MORE

Yesterday Was Nomination Day For the York Municipal Elections on September 5th

COMPLETE RETURNS ARE NOT AVAILABLE

But There Will be no Contests in Bright, Douglas, Kingsclear and New Maryland

In at least four of the parishes of York County the county councillors for the next two years have been returned by acclamation and in probably two or three other parishes there will be no contest.

Nominations in the municipal elections on Tuesday, September 5th, closed at six o'clock last evening, but up to noon today no returns had been received at the office of Secretary-Treasurer Bliss from Dumfries, Manners-Sutton, McAdam, North Lake, Queensbury or Southampton.

In three and perhaps four of these parishes it is thought there may be no contest, while in the parishes of Bright, Douglas, Kingsclear and New Maryland the candidates for election have been returned without opposition. The returns of nominations for those parishes, however, show the retirement of Colin Reynolds as well as Warden Rogers from Municipal politics.

This afternoon word was received that there would be no contest in Manners-Sutton, the following candidates having been nominated: S. B. Hunter, Robert Thompson, Alexander Little and Joseph Robison, the latter being a brother of the late Mr. Thos. Robison, who for many years represented the parish at the council board and was a member of the provincial legislature at the time of his death last spring.

AWARD CONTRACT FOR NEW \$15,000 MACHINE SHOPS

Work Will Start at Once on New Plant For The Smith Foundry Co. Ltd

MACHINERY WILL BE RUN BY ELECTRICITY

Contractor Thomas Myles, of St. Marys, Will Erect Modern Plant on King Street

The contract for building the modern new machine shop for the Smith Foundry Company, Limited, organized to take over the New Brunswick Foundry business here, lately conducted by Messrs. Smith Brothers, was awarded this morning to Mr. Thomas Myles, of St. Marys, the contract price being in the vicinity of \$15,000.

Tenders closed yesterday for construction upon plans prepared by Architect William E. Minne. The new building will be much larger than the structure destroyed by fire some time ago and will be 174 feet 6 inches long and 94 feet wide, extending from the present garage building up to the gate entering the foundry yard.

The building will be of brick, with stone trimmings, and there will be accommodations for the machine shop, blacksmith shop and pattern department, all on the first floor, while the offices will be on the second floor of the main building. Over the machine shop there will be a 30-foot travelling crane of ten tons capacity, which, as well as all the machinery of the new plant, will be run by electricity.

The building will be thoroughly lighted throughout with an abundance of windows, and there will be concrete floors throughout. There will be a basement under the entire main building and an improved heating system with the fanning principle, will be installed. There will be fire walls throughout the building and everything will be of modern design. Contractor Myles is to start work at once and the contract calls for the work to be completed about February 1st.
