Suggestion That the Farmers And Fairymen Meet at Moncton

(Continued from page 1.)
A successful meeting and offering them the freedom of the city.

Co-operative Warehouse Proposed.
President Magee announced that Major G. S. Kinnear, of Sussex, scheduled to speak Wednesday morning upon the subject "Co-operation" had found it impossible to attend the convention. He stated that the Kings County United Farmers' Association had become dissatisfied with the treatment given its members by dealers in St. John. A movement to establish a co-operative warehouse in St. John city on a co-operative plan had been begun and a committee had been appointed to push the matter forward. The suggested departments of the warehouse were dairy produce and milk, vegetables, meat and butter, eggs, cold storage, distributing.

Trouble had been experienced in regard to milk distribution which in St. John probably was the worst in Canada. Mr. Magee outlined the scheme finally decided upon and he claimed both producer and consumer would benefit. Milk would be purchased entirely on the butter fat test basis.

Vegetables would be graded so that the consumer could be sure of what he was buying and meats and poultry also would be graded, three classes being employed. Eggs would be graded, a candling plant being used for that purpose. The basis of grading dairy butter was not yet decided upon. The cold storage department would be used to influence prices and the distributing warehouse for general merchandise would be just what the meat and dairy industry needed. Stocks of groceries and other commodities would be carried and the profit sharing would be co-operative. The warehouse would be operated under the Farmers' Co-operative Limited of New Brunswick.

Hon. D. W. Mersereau, Minister of Agriculture, stated he was glad to hear of the movement and he was not in the best of health to take upon himself the job of addressing the convention.

He said he recognized the delegates present as being members of Canada's greatest industry. He was a strong believer in governments made for the people and stated he was on the platform to convince the farmers that the Provincial Department of Agriculture of which he was the head would do its utmost to carry out the wishes of those representatives from every county of the province.

The country needed home builders and men to help the youths and keep them from striking out for the cities, the centres of the country. He would be only too glad to have the convention refer any resolution they passed to him for consideration and would attempt to carry out their wishes. On behalf of the Department he stated the members were anxious to assist the farmers in any way they could and all had several years' experience in their own branches.

It was the intention of the Department to boom the dairying industry in the province and this had already been done in Madawaska county to some extent and would be carried on in the remainder of the province. He was glad to be able to endorse the operations of the lime crushing plant at Brookville and referred to the good work it had done. He concluded by saying that if the farmers did not wish to send delegations to him he would go to them to give them any help he could.

President Magee expressed appreciation at it. Mr. Mersereau's address and said it was not made for the purpose of getting help from the farmers in election times, but to furnish the farmers with any assistance he could; he felt that Mr. Mersereau would retain his seat for some years yet.

A. J. Doucet, of Moncton, arose to put a resolution that the meeting of the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association for next year be held in Moncton. There was some discussion over this
