Stella Maris Here

The s.s. Stella Maris, Capt. E. Hann, arrived here from the northward at 3.30 p.m. yesterday. The steamer had fairly fine weather since leaving here and made every part of call except Twillingate, which was blocked with ice, so that she landed passengers, freight and mail at Farmer's Arm, where she arrived Easter Sunday. Cape Fog was surrounded, also with heavy slob ice. The ship brought back 70 casks of fish from Bonavista with other freight, and as passengers: H. Earle, G. Oke, F. W. Blundon, A. Courage, M. Lane, R. Stone, H. Crawford, R. Fowler and 20 second class.

The Grace.

SOUTHAMPTON, April 10.
The new White Star liner Titanic, the biggest vessel afloat, started today on her maiden voyage to New York. She is 852 1/2 feet long, 92 1/2 feet beam; displacement 66,000 tons; net, 46,000 tons; and can carry 3,000 passengers.

LONDON, April 10.
General Booth is 83 years old today. He will announce his hope to visit Canada and the States before his 84th birthday; and says further, "China calls to me, and before I pass away, I must find men and money that the Salvation Army may play well its part in the Celestial Empire."

LONDON, April 10.
Every available seat has been booked in the House of Commons to-morrow when Premier Asquith will inaugurate the third attempt to establish Home Rule for Ireland. Hundreds to-day invaded the lobby, appealing, without avail, to members for permits. Asquith is expected to speak for two hours, and will be followed by Bonar Law and John Redmond.

LONDON, April 10.
It is affirmed that the Kaiser will visit England in June as the guest of his close personal friend, Lord Lansdale, who was at Potsdam some months during the friction between Germany and Britain, when he endeavoured to throw oil upon the troubled waters by an interview in which he represented the Kaiser as having nothing but the most friendly feelings towards Britain.

INDIANAPOLIS, April 10.
Soft coal miners are voting to-day for the acceptance or otherwise of the two years' contract drafted at the recent conference of miners and operators at Cleveland. That more than 90 per cent will approve is the belief of the National officials. The terms provide \$1.00 a ton for mined coal, or 5 cents a ton increase for screened, 3 cents for the run of the mine, and 4 cents for machine mined coal, and 5 1/2 per cent. increase for day's works.
