**Appeal For Belgian and French Refugees.**

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir:—The following extract is taken from an appeal for the Refugees sent by the Alliance Francaise to its branch in St. John's:—

"It is useless to linger on the immense amount of need and misery and suffering there is in France caused by the invasion and complete devastation of a part of the country as large as the whole of Belgium, for none can fail to see it and understand it. Innumerable villages and towns have been completely destroyed and their hundreds of thousands of inhabitants ruined and bereaved are to-day penniless and homeless. To the burden of caring for those thousands is added that of caring for one million Belgians who have sought refuge in France."

We hope that the Alliances Francaises will do their utmost to arouse a feeling of sympathetic charity towards the suffering in France amongst all those with whom they come in contact.

Suffering, misery, starving women and babies cry out to all who are humane and human for immediate relief whatever may be the cause. In the name of and for the "Secours National de France," instituted by M. G. Hanotaux and President Poincare for the relief of all suffering and need among the Belgian and French refugees we make an eager and pressing appeal to each group of the Alliance Francaise to do what it can for its cause."

Amongst the means suggested to obtain money for this cause is the plan that when bridge-parties are given through the coming months, each guest should be asked to subscribe some stated sum, however small, for the Fund. It is suggested that we cannot do better than to turn social pleasures into a means of helping our homeless and suffering friends of Belgium and the devastated North of France.

Would those who are willing to help in this, or any other way, please send their contributions to the Honorary Secretary of the Refugee Committee of the Alliance Francaise, Mr. John Fenelon, St. John's.

It is intended to forward the money each mail, if possible, as the need is so urgent.

**Contraband of War.**

Author of "At Good Old Slivash." When peace has been busted wide open and the nations of the earth are engaged in shooting at each other with whatever is handy the contraband of war gets into the war reports with great regularity.

A contraband of war is a commodity which would help a country in its nefarious work of reducing the population of its neighbours. When an article has been declared contraband any warship is entitled to run up the flag, give three cheers and grab the ship which carries it.

By this means, steel, copper, automobiles, wheat and other articles are being kept out of Germany by England at the present time. They would also be kept out of England if the English fleet would kindly look the other way long enough to let the German fleet get out of the Kiel Canal and begin to roam the ocean picking up chance acquaintances with the American merchant marines.

When a nation has enough cruisers it can be very officious about the contraband of war business and can keep the freight steamers of the world bobbing up and down on the high seas while its officers hunt for salt-petre in the stoke hold and examine the officers' quarters for signs of mules. They would become a calamity even to the non-combatant. However, we should bear the contraband of war rules patiently and endeavour to establish contraband of peace which would be a much more useful thing all around. If the United States cruisers could examine every incoming steamer for smuggled foreign husbands, new Argentine dances, Elinor Glyn novels, French gowns and Parisian comedienne and could declare these contraband of peace and liable to seizure, fumigation and sale, the cause of happiness would be greatly promoted in these parts and this country would become even more eminently desirable as a place of residence.

**Man Fell on Street**

AND IS SERIOUSLY INJURED.

At eleven o'clock to-day, a man named Alan English, who was engaged as foreman of the Reid Co.'s boiler-making department, accidentally fell on Duckworth Street, and as a result was seriously injured and is now at the General Hospital. English, who was passing along unaccompanied, tripped and being a man of big physique fell heavily, his head coming in contact with the ground where he lay prone for several minutes. Bystanders went to the aid of English who was in a semiconscious condition and unable to speak. A slight cut was inflicted in his forehead. Constables O'Flaherty and Dempsey arrived on the scene and brought the injured man to the police station where he was attended by Dr. Campbell, who, after dressing the wound, ordered the man to the hospital where he was conveyed in the ambulance, as concussion of the brain was feared.

**Milk Thief Rounded Up**

For some time past complaints have reached the police from citizens who had their supply of milk stolen from their doors in the East End section of the city but could not find out who was operating until an early hour this morning, when Const. O'Flaherty caught red-handed a lad named Morgan, aged 12, making his rounds and taking not less than four quart bottles of milk. The lad was immediately placed under arrest and on being brought to the lockup gave fictitious names—giving the names of other boys. He first answered to the name of Collins, next Kearney, then Skanes, and lastly, when he appeared before Judge Knight to-day, became known as Morgan. The lad was convicted, but in view of his tender years, and because of his honest, his Honour let him off on suspended sentence and paying costs.

**Recruiting in Newfoundland.**

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Mr. Editor,—Might I suggest now that the recruiting for our second military contingent is about to commence, and that the recruiting for the Naval Reserve is in full swing, that the newspapers publish daily a list of the applicants (not only those accepted) for both branches of the service as they come along. The publication of the names of those who have recently offered their services for the Naval Reserve force, and for the Newfoundland Regiment, would no doubt prove a stimulus to enlistment, as well as being interesting to the public. I also suggest that the Recruiting Committee of the Patriotic Association either formulate, (if they have not already done so) and make public some organized scheme for the holding of Patriotic meetings in the near future, or announce the fact that privately organized meetings will be in order and welcomed. There are, I feel sure, many members of the Patriotic Association, who are not officially appointed to any special sub-committees who are only too anxious to lend a hand in enlisting the public in the neighboring outposts, and in making them alive to the necessity for speedy response to the Recruiting Proclamations. The reports of lack of knowledge existing in even the near outposts as to the causes and purposes of the war are deplorable, and it is only by some real effort that the public in the outposts can be convinced of the great needs of the Empire, and be induced to come forward, and "do their bit." Meetings jointly attended and conducted by both the successful and unsuccessful candidates in the last general election, and by the clergymen of all denominations, would in my opinion have the best possible effect in helping the recruiting and removing wrong impressions as to the war and its aims. The mere publication of proclamations cannot be expected to enthrone a population not closely in touch with the progress of events.
