AUTHORESS DEAD.

LONDON, To-day. Wilfred Philip Ward, author and editor of the Dublin Review, died to-day at sixty years.

CHAPLIN MADE A BARON.

LONDON, To-day. Henry Chaplin, Unionist member of Parliament for Wimbledon, former President of the Local Government Board, has been created a peer. It is understood King George conferred the barony in order to relieve the recipient of the onerous duties of representing the important constituency of Wimbledon. He has been in failing health for some time, and had desired to resign his seat in the Commons without severing himself from connection with politics. The bestowal of the peerage and the giving him a seat in the Lords achieve the aim stated. The coalition candidate for his seat at Wimbledon will be Sir Stuart Ansell, C.B., widely known in America.

IRISH ATTORNEY GENERAL MADE JUDGE.

LONDON, To-day. John Gordon, Attorney General in Ireland, has been appointed Judge, and James Campbell has been appointed Attorney General in succession to the retiring incumbent.

POKKEE PLANE CAPTURED.

LONDON, To-day. The British War Office last night issued the following official communication: A Fokker monoplane descended inside our lines yesterday. The pilot who was unaccounted for was taken prisoner. To-day there was artillery activity about Neville, St. Vaast, Souchez, Hohenzollern, Riedt and Wysschete. The enemy sprang a mine in the Hohenzollern sector. At St. Eloi our troops held considerable portion of ground gained on March 27, including three out of the four main line of craters.

BUDGET OF WAR NEWS.

NEW YORK, To-day. The Bethincourt salient which for weeks had projected like a wedge into the German lines northwest of Verdun, has been evacuated by the French. The evacuation was carried out under cover of darkness. The French, through the move, have been enabled to straighten out their line, which, now runs from the corner of Avocourt Wood south, crossing the Bethincourt-Esnes and Bethincourt-Chattancourt Roads. Violent attacks delivered by Germans against the new positions found the French unwavering. The offensive of the Russians against the Germans in northwest Russia has simmered down to mutual bombardments and bombing attacks by German and Russian aviators. Artillery actions in Lake Narocz region continue and an infantry attack by Germans here was repulsed by Russian fire. Considerable fighting between Turks and Russians has taken place near the Black Sea with the Turks aggressors. Three attacks against Russian entrenchments on the right bank of the Karadere were without result. The Russians are pushing their advance against the Ottomans in Upper Tochoruk River region. Along the entire Austro-Italian front, artillery on both sides has been active. An official despatch from Salonika reports exchange of shots between German and French cavalry, on the Macedonian front and shelling, but without effect, of French trenches by Germans in the region of Givigli and Doiran.

ZAFRA SUNK.

LONDON, To-day. The British steamer Zafra has been sunk. According to Lloyd's report she is 3,578 tons.

AUSTRIANS BIG OFFENSIVE.

ROME, To-day. The Austrians are preparing an offensive on a large scale along the whole Italian front, according to a despatch received here which states that this action was decided on at a recent conference between Archduke Eugene and other Austrian commanders.

DUTCH SITUATION CRITICAL.

THE HAGUE, To-day. The international situation here is still one of extreme delicacy. So far as recent rumors of the landing of British are concerned, the Dutch press openly and by name accuses the Chancellor of the German Legation at

WITLESS BAY, To-day.

On Friday, April 7th, at 2.30 a.m., Mother M. John Leamy, of the Presentation Convent, Witless Bay, passed peacefully to her reward surrounded by her devoted Sisters and consoled by the presence and assistance of devoted priests, privileges which she well deserved from grateful friends. Missa Cantata de regine was celebrated by Rev. C. A. McCarthy on Saturday at 9 o'clock. Very Rev. Dean Roche, P.P., and Rev. P. J. O'Brien, P.P., Tor's Cove, were also in the Sanctuary. After Mass the last prayers were said and the remains of the good nun were consigned to Mother earth to await the resurrection call. A large concourse of people were present at the Mass and funeral to pay their last tribute of respect to the deceased, who had done so much for them. Mother M. John was born in Cahir Co., Tipperary, Ireland, came to Newfoundland in 1861 and entered the Presentation Order at Cathedral Square, St. John's in 1865. She was a most active Sister, a practical business woman, most useful and most painstaking teacher, a zealous worker for religion and for her older and last but in no sense least a sincere friend, one who will be long missed by her community. She labored faithfully, successfully and well during the fifty-one years which she spent in the religious life. Though invalided for some time, she remained at her duties until three days before her death when the last illness came on, she died in the 68th year of a life given since the age of 17 to Almighty God. We hope therefore that He who knows how to reward and to value life-long untiring, unselfish and unbounded sacrifices, and who looks all things for the best will take her to Himself, will recompense her at her true worth, and will be her reward exceeding great.—R.I.P.

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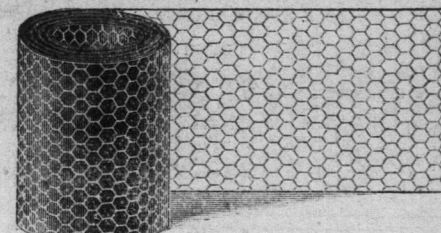
