

MEXICO MAKES RESTITUTION.

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 17. The Secretary of the Treasury has een ordered to make immediate payment to the United States Government of 10,000 pesos, representing the sum paid to obtain the ransom of Liuets. Harold G. Peterson and Paul H. Davis, American aviators, who were captured by Mexican bandits in August. The money will be delivered by a special messenger of the Treasry Department.


