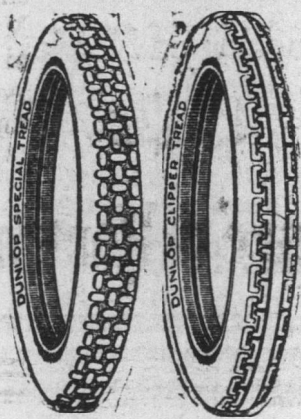

To-day's Messages.**NEW BISHOP OF NEW YORK.**

NEW YORK, Sept. 17. Right Rev. Charles Sumner Birch, Suffragan Bishop of the New York Diocese of the Protestant Episcopal Church, was elected Bishop of New York, on the third ballot, at a special Diocesan Convention to-day. He succeeds the late Bishop David H. Green.

BELGIAN ROYALTY FOR U.S.

BREST, Sept. 17. The steamship George Washington, on which King Albert and Queen Elizabeth of Belgium are to sail for the United States, will leave Brest to-morrow for Ostend, to take the royal party on board.

MEXICO MAKES RESTITUTION.

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 17. The Secretary of the Treasury has been ordered to make immediate payment to the United States Government of 10,000 pesos, representing the sum paid to obtain the ransom of Capt. Harold G. Peters and Paul H. Davis, American aviators, who were captured by Mexican bandits in August. The money will be delivered by a special messenger of the Treasury Department.

NO AMERICANS THERE.

ROME, Sept. 17. Contrary to an official statement from Fiume, saying that "an American contingent together with the English embarked," there was no American military contingent stationed in Fiume, or nearby, according to statements made by Colonel Buckley, American military attaché, and Brigadier General Johnson, a newly arrived attaché of the embassy.

GENERAL DIAZ RECALLED.

PARIS, Sept. 17. General Armando Diaz, commander in chief of the Italian army, has been recalled to Rome from Naples, where he had been on a vacation, according to a Havas despatch, dated Sunday, received from the Italian capital. Upon his arrival it was stated he entered upon a lengthy conference with King Emmanuel and the Italian Premier.

POWER'S NEW POLICY FOR CHINA.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 17. Discussing at length the Shantung provision of the Peace Treaty, President Wilson said in an address here to-day, that he had been assured by the Great Powers that under the League of Nations there would be a new international policy for the protection of Chinese integrity. The Powers, said Mr. Wilson, had Japan's promise to return Shantung to China, and intended to see that it was fulfilled under the League. He said he had asked colleagues at Versailles, specifically, whether they meant under the League to inaugurate a new policy toward China, and they told him they did. Far from being detrimental to China's interests, declared Mr. Wilson, the Treaty really was the first in the world's history to do something for China's benefit. In all previous instances of Chinese territory, he said, the United States had not even protested.

ALL PAST AND GONE.

OTTAWA, Sept. 17. Whatever semblance of a "love feast" there may have been against the National Industrial Conference, in the first days proceedings, it is all past and gone. The recommendations of the Royal Commission on industrial relations labor bettering labor conditions in Canada, which has been supplied by the labor group, has been somewhat roughly handled at times by their opponents, and the resolution on shortening the hours of labor, went to the committee at noon to-day with both sides apparently unmoved.

ON THE INCREASE.

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 17. Capital cases are on the increase. Already this year there have been eighteen, or fifty per cent. more than for the whole of last year. And judgments in the September Assizes are still to come. This year's cases are made up as follows. Executions 11; Commutations 5; Suicide 1; Deceased prior to date fixed for execution 1; Total 18. The total for last year was twelve.

AGAINST DEMOCRACY.

BERLIN, Sept. 17. The assertion is made by the Vorwarts correspondent that the German Military Govt. in the Baltic provinces is rapidly growing, and that officers and men are arriving there daily from Germany. Even the smallest places in Courland are strongly occupied. The notices displayed in the office of Staff Capt. Slower at Hausk, Courland, says the correspondent, read, "Fight for the Kaiser and the Empire against Democracy." "We had rather die than be dishonored."

WILL TAKE IT INTO UNION.

CAPE TOWN, S.A., Sept. 17. (Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—During committee stage in the Assembly on the mandate bill, in connection with South West Africa, Mr. Dewet, Minister of Justice, stated that the system of administration and taxation in South West Africa would be gradually assimilated with that of the Union. Hon. Mr. Millan, Minister of Mines, declared that the diamond output of South West Africa would be compulsorily handed over to the Union-Government for disposal. The Govt. would be guided in this matter by an advisory board on which the diamond producers would be represented.

AUSTRALIAN LABOR REPRESENTATION.

SYDNEY, Australia, Sept. 17. (Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—Premier Hughes states that it has been definitely decided that Australia is to be represented at the International Labor Congress in America, but the delegation has not yet been chosen.

Overpraise is disservice to the thing or person praised.

Everyone knows that.

Everyone has had the experience of having a story or a tale or a pretty girl so highly praised beforehand, that the actuality of the thing or person is only tenderly remembered and even resentful. I am sure one would disagree with me so far.

But outraged sentimentality is going to give a cry of dissent when venture to step farther. For I dare think that it is even possible for mothers to over-praise their children.
