WILLARD CHARGED WITH PRO-FITEERING.

Kansas City, Mo., Dec. 17 .- A federal warrant charging profiteering in the sale of cordwood, a violation of the Lever act, was issued late to-day for Jess Willard, former heavyweight champion, by Fred Robertson, United States district attorney for Kansas. Willard will appear before O. Q. Claffin, jun., United States commissioner, in the federal court in Kansas City, Kansas, to-morrow, Mr. Robert-

Willard, who was at his home near Lawrence, Kansas, when notified by telephone of the federal action, said that he would appear voluntarily to-

morrow to answer the charge. The warrant names W. C. Anderson and J. E. Wilson, members of a fuel committee at Topeka, Kansas, as having purchased cordwood from Willard. It is alleged that Willard asked and received \$3.50 a cord for wood on the stump from his farm near Topeka. That amount, the district attorney asserts, is double what it should have been. Attorney-General Palmer has een notified of the action taken, Mr. Robertson said.
