Reception for Eastern Prelate.

Sydney, July 23.—His Grace Archbishop Shukurallah Courhi, of Mount Lebanon, Syria, who arrived in the city on Thursday evening, in the course of his world-wide tour to Assyrian communities, celebrated Mass at St. Patrick's church this morning and preached a most eloquent sermon to the Assyrian people. His Grace spoke of the duties of citizenship devolving upon his compatriots in the lands in which they have settled, emphasizing the duty which rests upon them to be loyal to authority and to endeavour to serve faithfully worthy causes. It was an admirable sermon, and delivered in the people's native tongue, and was followed by them with closest attention.

His Grace was accompanied to Sydney by Rev. Louis Soalb, priest of St. Patrick's parish, who went to Halifax a day or so ago to meet him. At the station the Archbishop was met by a committee representing St. Patrick's people, and, after greetings had been extended, he was driven to Sacred Heart glebe house, where he will be a guest during his stay in the city. The reception committee was made up of A. K. Libbus, H. Joseph, Louis Maroun and Thomas Maroun.

On Sunday evening His Grace will be the guest of honor at a reception in the Lyceum. Other guests will include representatives of the city and other leading citizens. The reception will be tendered by the Assyrian people of the community.

From Sydney Archbishop Courhi will go to Newfoundland. After spending a few days there he will come back to Canada and travel to all the leading cities of the country to visit the several Assyrian communities.

Rev. Father Wakeem, who accompanied His Grace from New York to the maritime provinces, did not come to Sydney, as it was necessary for him to return to the United States.

Accident Repeats.

A somewhat similar accident to that met by the Resolute in the first race of this year's yacht races caused Sir Thomas Lipton to withdraw his first Shamrock in the regatta of 1899. In the second race of that series, with Columbia defending the cup and Shamrock in the challenging role, the British craft carried away her topmast, and was withdrawn. Columbia continued on and completed the race, which was a 10-mile triangular contest, and was credited with a victory. As Columbia won the "first" race and the third without difficulty, the Irish baronet's initial attempt to lift the cup failed.

Adrift For 10 Days.

SYDNEY, July 19.—After drifting about Cabot Strait for ten days and ten nights in a leaky launch with practically nothing to eat, Captain Sam Suaine and his crew of two, have been landed at North Sydney by the coasting steamer Stella Maris, which took them off St. Paul's Island two days ago.

Captain Suaine, Joseph Snook and Martin Buddin are Newfoundlanders. Two weeks ago they bought a ten-ton launch at Glace Bay and started to sail it to Carbonear, Newfoundland, where they plan to operate a ferry between Carbonear and Belle Island. The route they proposed was to follow the coast from Glace Bay to Cape North, then to Part aux Basques, then down the coast to St. John's. Off Ingonish the launch then commenced to leak but was patched up and voyage continued. In sight of St. Paul's Island, the engines broke down and the sails were blown to tatters.

For ten days they drifted about in the Gulf with but a few biscuits to eat, and the launch leaking steadily. On the tenth day, with the launch half full of water and about ready to sink they again sighted St. Paul's, off Cape North. By super-human efforts they managed to keep the boat afloat until it drifted into Campbell's Cove. Captain Suaine says that ten minutes more would have finished them, as the boat was nearly full of water and the men were too exhausted to swim ashore.

Governor MacLeod fed and housed the men until the Stella Maris came along. Nothing was known of the affair until the arrival of the Stella Maris, because a vessel recently fouled the Cape North-St. Paul's cable with her anchors, and cut the wire to free herself.

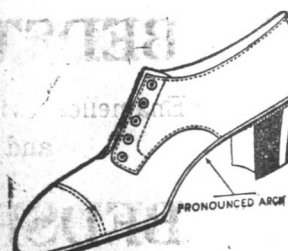
