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At Last.

A despatch from London last week recalls one provision of the Peace Treaty which the public had almost forgotten, or if not forgotten probably entertained little hope that it would ever be carried into execution. It is recalled by the report that British soldiers were summoned to testify in a London Court against German officers accused of cruelty and inhuman treatment of their prisoners of war. It is stranger still that these victims of German brutality are testifying against their persecutors in the presence of German lawyers themselves before a London Court. These German lawyers are not acting, at least ostensibly, as counsel for the accused. On the contrary, they are prosecuting on behalf of the German Government. They have gone to London to get information in this way against the "war criminals" and the evidence they receive in London it is said, will be used at the trial of the accused before the German Court at Leipzig.

It is not likely that many of the German "war criminals" will ever be brought to book and justice done in this way. Most of them will undoubtedly go scot free, but there is at least some satisfaction in the fact that evidence is being presented against some of them. If the Germans have any regard at all for what is demanded of them in the interests of justice and humanity, which is doubtful, there will be the hope that the wrongs suffered by British prisoners of war will be in some measure avenged. But the world will be very skeptical until the German Court at Leipzig hands out punishment to fit the crimes.—Halifax Morning Chronicle.

A Wise Bulldog.

Great Britain is a wise old bulldog. She shows her teeth, but seldom bites. When she does bite, she never lets go. Pat her and she is most friendly. Kick her and she gives a warning growl. Try to take away a place of her meat or even one of the bones, and there is a fight.

Her wisdom in protecting a litter of little bulldogs and mongrels, is to be seen in every province of the mandate regulations recently published. These are nominally a product of the League Council. But in every line is to be seen British policy as to outlying possessions. She is the great colonizer and has not failed to learn by experience.

Her policy is based upon regarding all people of all lands, of all degrees of development, of every color and race, just as human beings. She recognizes at the same time the variance in temperament which is evidenced in religion, customs and mode of life. These are not disturbed. Her policy of development is by slow progression along racial and natural lines. She never flies in the face of Providence by demanding racial changes, or that any people shall do or become the impossible.

So in these mandate regulations are found only preventives. There is to be no slavery, involuntary servitude, liquor or narcotic traffic, or trading in arms. There is to be only a native police force, but no military establishment. All other trading is open to all countries. The land and resources are to be developed for the benefit of the natives who are to be guided to self-government. There will be no fortification and the system is the opposite of that of Germany.

To Palestine as governor general, Great Britain has sent a Jew. Over Mesopotamia she intends to place Faisal, the brilliant young Arab, whose armies and those of his father materially helped conquer the Turkish-German combination. An Arab kingdom will be established with Faisal, who was driven by the French from Syria, as king.

A Jew will rule over the Jews, an Arab over the Arabs, and the British will be the protector, advisor, and unobtrusive, controlling power. The bulldog never fails to add to her breed any stray, unattached animals. She does not, however, try to make bulldogs of them. She lets them stay of their own kind, but develops in them all that excess of loyalty shown in the war. They growl at their foster mother, but fight for her.

It is also distinctly British that, though these mandate regulations are distinctly British and unobjectionable, the Commons grown because not submitted to their approval in advance. The result will probably be insistence on its approval after the fact, and this will finally be given, but the Bulldog dignity preserved.

This revision against having something done for it without its prior consent is reminiscent of our own Anglo-Saxon Senate. But the mandate are so evidently British that consent will not probably be withheld. Had America similarly dominated the treaty provisions and the covenant, there would probably have been ratified. The trouble there was that they were not American in spirit as in fact.

Names in the Navy.

The commissioning at Devonport recently of the new cruiser "Raleigh" is a reminder of the comparatively small number of warships which take their names from the great seamen of the past. There was, during the war, the battleship "Lord Nelson," but she is now in the sale list. There was also a cruiser "Drake," which was sunk by torpedoes. The battleships "St. Vincent" and "Collingwood" are among the eight early Dreadnoughts which the Admiralty have decided to scrap. The name of Blake, the great Commonwealth sea commander, is only borne by a depot-ship, now at Harwich; and of the pre-war "Admiral" class, named after Duncan, Cornwallis, Exmouth, Russell and Albemarle, all are now gone. Lord Hood, who has given his name to our latest completed battle-cruiser, is the one of the old-time seamen most adequately represented, and then come Lord Barham and Admiral Benbow, after whom battleships are named.

Meeting and Concert.

A general meeting of the S.D.L.I. was held in the Casino last evening. There was a very large audience. Mr. D. Redmond acted as chairman and after the membership cards had been handed in an excellent concert, in which a number of leading artists took part, was thoroughly enjoyed. The President of the Local Council, Hon. M. P. Gibbs, gave a twenty minutes' address on Irish affairs. The meeting terminated at 10.30. It is the intention to hold a series of similar meetings and concerts in future.
