It follows that all seashore animals must be well-trained soldiers, skilled in the arts of defence and offence. We find that their methods of warfare are not dissimilar from our own.

Take, for example, the limpet, softbodied snail. It is a plant cater: so, from the military point of view, its chief concern is defence. Among its enemies must be reckoned sea birds, big fish, crabs, dog-whelks. Its stout, tent-shaped shell is specially evolved to resist the attacks of all these. It is actually a fort-a tank, in

fact, for it can move. But no fort or tank designed by man or beast is impregnable. Often the hard shells of limpets are drilled by dog-whelks, often they are "rush-
