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## In the Realms of Sport

### REGATTA COMMITTEE MEETING.

### CADETS DEFEAT STAR.

There was a large attendance present at St. George's Field last night to witness the football game between the Star and Cadets. The evening was ideal for football and although the game proved rather one-sided, ending in a victory for the Cadets by 6 goals to nil it might be said the tallness of the score was only a flash in the pan to the brand of football doled out. The Star eleven was composed of new material, and in making their initial appearance against a superior team, they played the game manfully and well and but for the fact of one or two of the Cadet forwards lying low, waiting an opportunity to get into the tricky play and timely passing, with the result that three goals were logged home in short order. Time and again the Star lads made determined efforts to get the ball into their opponent's camp, but the stalwart defence set up by Kavanagh and Brown proved too much for them.

conditions, aside from political bombastics, are sound, and even in the latter aspect conditions are improving, as people recognize the ability and soundness of President Coolidge.

With 110,000,000 people almost fully employed and at high wages, thus insuring a big purchasing power for some time to come, and with stocks in the hands of producers, manufacturers, jobbers, and retailers, on the whole, not more than normal, we are now entering the period of the year when invariably there is a revival in business.

The purchasing power of the dollar is greater to-day than at any time during the past five or six years. Money is cheap and there is no danger of stringency for some time to come.

"Conditions abroad are on the mend and moving in this direction faster than we in America generally realize. There is a strong probability that the Dawes report will be adopted as the basis of the readjustment of the economic situation in Europe. This will give tremendous impetus to confidence and finally to business on the other side."

"There is practical assurance of the nomination of President Coolidge next week at Cleveland, and an almost equally assured probability that there will be elected in November. I cannot feel other than strongly bullish at this time on our whole situation, and that it is time the security market began to discount, at least in part, these favorable prospects."

## Rules Given to Overcome Danger of Electric Shock

Chicago, June 11. (A.P.)—The rules for first aid in cases of high voltage shock are based on the fact that the victim's lungs become paralyzed, and success in saving life depends upon keeping up artificial respiration until normal breathing is resumed, Willis MacLachlan of the National Electric Light Association, told the American Medical Association's convention to-day.

"Since cases are on record of lives saved after three and one-half hours of artificial respiration, four hours of effort are recommended before artificial respiration is given up," he said. "The rules are as follows: 'The victim is cleared from the current, either by shutting off the current, or pulling him away with the aid of rubber gloves, dry clothing, or sticks of wood, to serve as non-conductors. If it is necessary to cut the wire, a hatchet or implement with a wooden handle should be used and the operator should turn his face away to avoid the flash. The patient is then laid face down, with one arm up and the other supporting his face so that the mouth and nose are free from breathing. Artificial respiration should be begun at once, while an assistant loosens the clothing necessary, holds ammonia to the victim's nose and keeps him as warm as possible. If the victim must be moved, this should be done in a reclining position, and the artificial respiration should be kept up. After he resumes breathing, he should be watched, and if he stops, artificial respiration should be resumed. The prone pressure method is that in which the man applying first aid straddles the patient and presses both hands on the small of the victim's back, releasing the pressure rhythmically every two or three seconds, and imitating his own breathing as much as possible."
