**YESTERDAY'S LATE MESSAGES**

**TURKISH TROOPS ON IRAQ FRONTIER.**  
GENEVA, Sept. 14. Unverified reports, circulating in Geneva, state that the Turks have massed seventy thousand troops on the Iraq frontier as the means of forcing a favourable decision of the Mosul dispute with Great Britain.

**PREPARING TO WELCOME THE PRINCE.**  
LONDON, Sept. 14. Plans are already on foot for a great reception for the Prince of Wales on his return early next month from South Africa and South America. He is expected to reach Portsmouth on October 9th. The Duke of York plans to meet him at Portsmouth and the King and Queen at Victoria Station, London.

**BOYCOTT AGAINST JAP GOODS LIFTED.**  
AMOY, China, Sept. 14. The boycott against Japanese shipping, brought on by the anti-foreign strike, has been lifted. The British boycott continues.

**PLANNING TO OVERTHROW RED REGIME.**  
PARIS, Sept. 14. The details of the new offensive against Moscow, with Grand Duke Nicholas, leading the fight, for the overthrow of the Bolsheviks, will be planned at a great meeting of Russian emigres from all over the world here in the middle of November.

**CHANNEL DEFEATS EGYPTIAN SWIMMER.**  
BOULOGNE, France, Sept. 14. Ismaik Helmy, the Egyptian swimmer, who started across the Channel this morning, gave up his attempt to swim the distance when 3 1/2 miles from Dover this afternoon.

**SAILINGS TO WEST INDIES WILL BE CONTINUED.**  
HALIFAX, Sept. 14. Continuation of the sailings of the Royal Mail Steam Packet steamers from this port and St. John to British West Indies, is indicated in a statement given out this afternoon by the head office of the Company here, which stated the service would be maintained as usual until March 26, pending ratification of the British West Indies Trade Treaty with Canada.

**STEAMER FLOATS OFF REEF.**  
HALIFAX, Sept. 14. The United States Shipping Board steamer, Argo, which went ashore on a submerged reef four miles from West Light, Sable Island, early this morning, floated off with the tide at seven this evening and proceeded under her own steam for Halifax.

**Doubts the Veracity**

Dear Sir:—As an old waltzian I was greatly interested in the report of trout fishing in Fortune Bay, given by Mr. W. R. Warren, in your issue of to-day. I suppose the fish referred to were salt water trout, as no man could very well carry four hundred and sixty-six pounds of fish from any far inland water, and no mention is made of a horse and wagon or other means of transportation. If they were fishing from a canoe, dory or motor boat, and the catches of the three men were about equal, as stated, then they must have had on board about ten quintals, or more, of green fish besides the anglers, which would mean probably another five cwt. I do not know the carrying capacity of these western boats, but I am a bit doubtful of the performance. Hoping this will result in eliciting further information, I am, dear Sir,

**Obituary**

**ISADORE CHAISSON (Channel).**  
There passed away at Channel Port aux Basques, Nfld., on Sept. 4th an old and respected citizen, in the person of Mr. Isidore Chaisson at the ripe age of 88 years. Mr. Chaisson came to this country from Margaree, Cape Breton, some 68 years ago, and has been residing in Channel since then. Mr. Chaisson was the father of 17 children, 13 of whom are now living: 5 in Channel, 1 in St. John's, 3 in Halifax, 3 in North Sydney and 1 in Providence, U.S.A. He leaves behind in addition to his thirteen children, 85 grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren. For the past 13 years he has been living with his son, Capt. Alex. Chaisson at Channel, who was away at the time of his father's death, but arrived just in time for the funeral, which took place on Tuesday, Sept. 8th, interment being at the Church of England Cemetery at Channel. In the presence of Mr. Chaisson the community loses one of the old standards for very many years lived the winner of storms of this coast in carrying on the staple industry of the country. To his sorrowing relatives and friends we extend our sympathy, and pray that his soul may rest in peace.—COM.

**THOMAS WORNELL.**

On August 27th there passed away at Greenspond one of its oldest and most respected citizens in the person of Thomas Wornell at the ripe age of 81 years. He was one who always took a deep interest in local and public affairs, being Chairman of the local Road Board and Deputy Sheriff, holding both positions for a number of years. For about fifty years he was a member of the Loyal Orange Association, being one of the first members here, and was Past Master of the Primary Lodge and Past Commander of the Royal Society; he also was Guardian of the Loyal Orange Young Britons. He was laid to rest in the Methodist Cemetery on Sunday, 30th of August, the Pastor, Rev. G. L. Mercer officiating. After the church services were performed both the Orange and Orange Young Briton Associations paid their last respect to one whom all honoured as a Brother by the reading of both Burial Services. Left to mourn are two sons, Aber, at present on S.S. Spusu and Edmund J. Magistrate on the lower Labrador service; one sister, Mrs. Samuel Stretton living at Valleyfield, and two brothers, John residing at St. John's and Peter residing at Greenspond and nine grandchildren.

**Snapshots in Colors**

A simplified method of color photography recently demonstrated in Paris, may hasten the day when we all can take snapshots that will register green trees and blue sky.  
Instead of the old color photograph method, requiring three separate exposures, Rousseau (discoverer of the new method), found that he could get better results by a single exposure of three films placed one upon the other in the camera. Only a single plate needs to be developed.  
The first film registers blue and violet, the second green, while yellow, orange, and red are registered on the third.
