



Lord Kitchener then proceeds to

explain that the responsibility for the war rests with the burghers, "Whose invasion of unprotected Bri-tish territory opened the saddest page in South African history." He quotes a letter from a member of the Volksraad to a member of the Cape **O**olony Assembly, declaring that "the time is ripe to drive the English from South Africa." In conclusion, Lord Kitchener de

In conclusion, Lord Altenene de-clares that, having annexed the two Republics to Great Britain he can-not break faith with the people, who have shown loyalty to the new regime, and so far as clemency to Cape Colony rebels is concerned, which must be exercised with unfet tered discretion.
