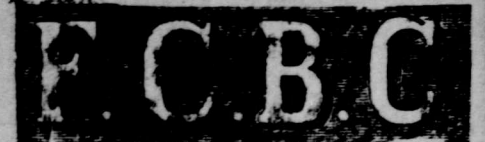


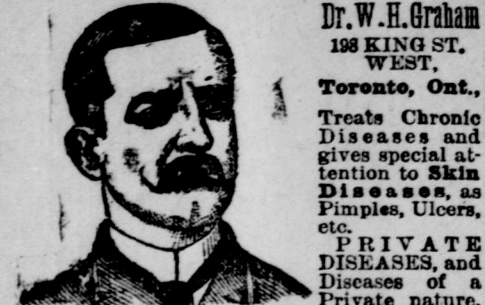

BITTEN BY A BIG FISH.
A Story From Renfrew—A Clergyman's Mishap.

Renfrew, Sept. 8.—Rev. Mr. Webster, the Methodist minister, who has been at camp near Bonnechere Point, met with a curious experience, which might have been of a very serious nature. A Record Breaker.

aldermen to the city clerk.

"It's a matter of no importance," said the mayor to Ald. Pritchard. "I have something good to tell you. I have just seen a telephone message to the city solicitor, and he informs me the meeting is legal."

But Ald. Pritchard's irate breast was going to be finished first. "That's got nothing to do with my question," he said, turning again on Mr. Kingston. "Did you say that it was illegal to record the yeas and nays?"

The Mayor—I said no such thing. Ald. Pritchard—I object to that insinuation. You said I didn't know anything about it.

The Mayor—No, I did not. I never insinuate anything; I say exactly what I mean.

THE CULMINATING KICK.

After several other kicks of various kinds, including one from the Governor-General, the culminating kick came about 10 o'clock, just before adjournment. It arose over the third reading of the \$100,000 sewerage bylaw which was adopted at the polls.

Said Ald. Pritchard: "It's a strange thing, that in a bylaw of that description, the promoters should resort to the plugging that was done in that election. The mayor ordered another bylaw to be read.

Ald. Pritchard rose and walked in front of the mayor's chair. "I won't forget the way you have sat on me tonight," he said, shaking his finger at his worship. Then he sat through the door, and the aldermen breathed more freely.

THE COMMITTEE REPORTS.

In the brief periods between Ald. Pritchard's kicks the council managed to do a little business.

Ald. John Heaman presented No. 3 committee's report. It recommended free water be supplied for the fountain erected at St. Andrew's Church. Carrothers on a division.

Ald. Parnell read the report of the Board of Works. In connection therewith Ald. Cooper moved to have Central Avenue graveled at once, but the motion was lost. Ald. Parnell as-
