burned.

POLYGAMISTS

Should be Banned From Holding Office
--So the M. E. Conference Says.

Chicago, May 25.--At Thursday's ses-
sion of the Episcopal Methodist confer-
ence, Dr. J. M. King submitted a mem-
orial to congress asking for the pas-
sage of an amendment to the constitu-
tion of the United States, prohibiting all
persons practicing polygamy, and
barring them from the privilege of
holding public office. It was read and
adopted without discussion.

As the board of the board of
bishops direct the affairs of the Meth-
odist Sisterhood of Deaconesses was re-
ported to the committee having that
bureau's affairs in charge as a meas-
ure calculated to pacify the warring
elements in the struggle between those
affiliated with the homes under the Woman's
Home Missionary Society and those
connected with the Independent
order of which the Chicago home is the
most important station. The commit-
tee is said to be practically unanimous
for adoption.

PASSENGERS DELAYED

Rochester, N. Y., May 25.--The ex-
cursion steamer Cambria, bound from
Toronto to Oswego, was forced to stop
when a few miles out of Toronto yester-
day, on account of an accident to her
machinery. In a short time she
started ahead again, and reached Car-
lotte last night, where her load of 200
passengers were discharged. A special
train was made up and the excursion-
ists taken to Oswego, where they
will take train for New York.

DROWNED.

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., May 25.--Clay-
ton Ford Stanley, the 7-year-old son
of Arthur Stanley, of the firm of
Stanley & Paterson, electrical sup-
plies, New York, was drowned in a
pool on his father's country place at
Northwood, Dutchess county, last
evening. The boy went out in a
rowboat with his pet dog. He stood up
and threw the dog overboard to see if
it would swim. As he had often done be-
fore, then he lost his balance and
fell out of the boat, being drowned be-
fore assistance could reach him.

Samuel B. Coleman, of Oxford Mills,
Ont., while fishing in the Rideau
River on Thursday was drowned.

How the accident happened is not
known.

British Columns Reach Vrede Fort Road Unopposed--Very

Near the Vaal--Buller's Forces Enter the Transvaal Near

Ingogo--Roberts' Advance Delayed by High Water

in the Rhenoster River--Free Staters Bolting

Like Hares--Kruger Says He Will Fight

to the Bitter End.

Warrenton, Thursday, May 24. -- Op-

erations have been pushed forward 80

miles, one of Gen. Hunter's brigades

having occupied Vryburg last night.

Considering the difficulties of the road,

this is a remarkable achievement for a

mixed force, short of rations, making

forced marches. Water is scarce. Some

portions of the brigade covered eighteen

miles without a break.

Gen. Hunter personally goes to Vry-

burg today by train.
