Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 4.—Champion Jeffries was the star performer at a fire which destroyed the building occupied by the Pioneer Roll Paper Company and the Lacey Manufacturing Company in Main street. Jeffries once worked as a boiler-maker for Lacey and was visiting his old stamping ground when the blaze was discovered in the quarters occupied by the paper company.

"He was first on the scene of action," said one of the employees, "and he handled those 300 pound rolls of paper as if they were diplomats he was passing out to a class of graduates and never took his coat off."

"It was warmer work than going after Corbett," said the big fighter, when it was all over, "and I am only sorry we could not head off the blaze."

THE YOUNG METHODISTS

Work of the Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues.

Toronto, Sept. 4.—Rev. Dr. Carmichael occupied the chair at the annual meeting Wednesday of the Sunday School and Epworth League Board of the Methodist Church. In his opening address he declared that the work of the church among the young people was more important than the work of the House of Commons.

Reports presented showed everything satisfactory as far as finances go. According to a report read by E. S. Casswell, general secretary of Epworth Leagues, there are now 2,341 Methodist Sunday schools in Canada, the total membership of which is 388,107. The general secretary of Epworth Leagues reported that there are 1,776 Epworth Leagues in the Dominion and 69,696 leaguers. These 69,696 gave \$29,551 for missions during the past year, which is an increase of \$5,000 over the previous year.

BRITAIN FIGHTS THE SEA

Waves Wash Away the Cliffs of Albion.

London, Sept. 4.—Ramsgate visitors just now have a fine opportunity of seeing the havoc wrought to Britain by the sea, and especially of observing the progress of a splendid example of the work of a sea defense.

The life of Thanet, on which Ramsgate stands, notably illustrates the work of the sea in ruthlessly taking away with one hand and giving back with the other. It is not many hundred years since Thanet was really an island. Ships used to sail to London through a great channel from Sandwich to Reculver instead of round by Ramsgate and Margate. But the sea silted up the estuary and put the port of Sandwich, which, 400 years ago, was a sea port, a mile and a half back inland.

At the same time it cut and washed away the cliffs of the northern side, and is doing so at the rate of two feet a year at the present time.

Just lately the sea has been eating away at Ramsgate's promenade, and in the last ten or twelve years has taken away bodily 600 feet of cliff-top promenade twelve to twenty feet wide. When it is considered that the cliffs are 70 to 80 feet high, the enormous amount of erosion will be faintly understood.

TURKS THREATEN AN ENGLISHMAN

The Correspondent of Daily Mail Has a Narrow Escape in Albania.

London, Sept. 4.—The Daily Mail's correspondent, in a dispatch from Monastir, dated Aug. 31, tells of an ineffective attempt he made to penetrate the Albanian cordon. He was threatened with death and compelled to return under a guard. He gives numerous instances of Turkish brutality and treachery. The villagers of Arnesko were massacred before a single insurgent visited the place. The inhabitants of the village of Nevolka were butchered while on their way to Florina under guard, having surrendered on a guarantee of immunity. At Florina, continues the correspondent, the Christians are in a state of abject fear, and are handicapped by a bigoted Greek metropolitan, who orders them to stay in the village and not to flee, with the result that the savage soldiery murder them by scores. The European residents of Monastir, including the consuls, are in a state of great anxiety. Many, including the Italian consul, have recently been insulted by soldiers. Operations commenced last Thursday on an organized scale against the insurgents and bodies of troops are operating in all directions, but no details have yet arrived.

Sofia, Sept. 4.—A council, presided over by Prince Ferdinand, and attended by the Premier and Ministers of Interior, War and Justice, was held at the palace of Bukharest, near Varna, yesterday. No definite news was received from the insurgent general staff has issued a proclamation throughout Macedonia, asking for the support of the population, and pointing out that the revolutionaries are not fighting for a neighboring power, but for human rights. More fighting is reported from the district of Debre. The Turks attacked the revolutionaries at the village of Damir, in the district of Debre, and a company of Albanian troops, passing through the valley of Kitchero, was slaughtered by revolutionaries. The Turkish troops recently made an attack to take a pass occupied by insurgents, through the valley of the Satek river, but were defeated with great loss.

Constantinople, Sept. 3.—Official reports say that the Turks, on reconquering Kilastra, Albania, killed 200 insurgents. It is also stated that the inhabitants of the coast villages are returning to their homes.

THE FISCAL CAMPAIGN

Great Activity Amongst the Chamberlains.

London, Sept. 4.—Up to the end of August the Birmingham tariff committee has issued fifteen leaflets for the purpose of circulating a policy of demand for the literature is enormous all over the country. A great meeting of Birmingham workmen last night endorsed the Chamberlain movement. Peter Ball, the Canadian Government agent, spoke in favor of the United States. The Chamberlain movement, Great Britain, if Canada did not receive a preference, there should arise no feeling of disloyalty if Canada gave the United States the same preference she now gives England. English manufacturers would soon be wiped out of Canada. Canada would have been in the arms of the United States long ago if it had not been for loyalty to the mother country.

CONVICTS BREAK FROM GUARDIANS

Sensational Escape of Three Prisoners En Route for Kingston Prison.

Toronto, Sept. 4.—Four prisoners in charge of Sheriff Thompson, and an officer from Port Arthur, made a desperate break for liberty from a train near Parkdale at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

The convicts were being conveyed from Port Arthur to Kingston penitentiary. The distance from Port Arthur to Owen Sound had been made by boat, and from Owen Sound they had proceeded by train Saturday morning.

The move was made by one convict leaping through the car window. While the officers were active in his capture, the other three also took advantage of the opportunity, and took French leave.

One of the prisoners was recaptured, but the three others have not yet been captured.

The men and their terms are: Thos. Burns, sentenced to four years for burglary; Alex. P. Duncan, two years for robbing persons; Henry Jansen, five years for burglary, and John Foster, two years for robbing persons.

Four of them, including John Foster, were handcuffed and chained together, and in some way they got a saw and saved the chains connecting the handcuffs. Burns and Duncan jumped from the end of the car, but Jansen, a big man, jumped through the car window, although the train was going 25 miles an hour. Foster did not escape, and was recaptured, received a stunning blow from Jansen, proceeded to Kingston last night with Foster.

ONTARIO CONSERVATIVES

They Pass Several Resolutions and Elect Officers at Toronto.

Toronto, Sept. 3.—Over 250 delegates from all parts of the province attended the annual meeting of the Ontario Liberal-Conservative Association held in Victoria Hall this afternoon. Mr. J. J. Fox was in the chair and the most enthusiastic was shown.

The principal business before the meeting was the election of officers and the passing of a series of interesting and important resolutions. The Grand Trunk Pacific deal was vigorously denounced and Mr. Borden's alternative proposal approved. The meeting also reaffirmed the Conservative party's belief in preferential trade and passed a strong vote of confidence in Mr. Jordan and Mr. Whitney.

On motion of Major Beath, ex-M.P., seconded by the Rev. J. E. H. of London, a resolution was passed reaffirming the Conservative party's belief in the principle of preferential trade, and the chair and expressing the highest satisfaction with Ben. Joseph Chamberlain's struggle for an imperialist policy. The meeting also endorsed the declaration of the recent congress of commercial bodies in London, and the Chamberlain movement, which would lead to the advantage of all its majesty's subjects, and in particular to Canada.

The association passed a resolution of condolence to the family of the late Hon. J. J. Fox, and a vote of thanks to the honorary presidents of the organization.
