Despite Heavy Cuts---New U. S. Bill Will Give Increase.

GAIN \$350,000,000

Washington, D. C., March 10 .- Portions of the new tariff bill were sent to the Government printing office tonight, and it is expected that the entire m asure will be in type by Wednesday. While nothing was officially given out as to the recommendations of the framers, Washington tonight heard many of the changes they are said to

In the talk about the new schedules it is reported, among other things, that less. despite the great cuts to be made on certain classes of goods the new measure will provide additional revenue of at least \$350,000,000 annually. millions of this increase, it is said, will come from the advance on coffee, on which a duty of 4 cents will levied. This is a compromise with the Porto Ricans, who asked a 6-cent levy.

There will be a hard fight over this section when the bill comes up for passage. The effort to obtain free hides is being made by the New England shoe and leather manufacturers, and is strongly opposed by the cattlemen of the west. An impression prevails that the plan is to have the hide and leather schedule fixed in conference after the questions have been thoroughly thrashed out on the floor of the House and Senate.
