## LOCAL BANK CLEARINGS SHOW BIG INCREASE

### Infallible Indication of Return- ing Prosperity in Canada —The Figures—

Bank clearings in London show a tremendous increase for the month of June, as compared with those of June, 1908.

A year ago the total for the month was only \$4,669,235, whereas this year the June clearings total \$5,356,457, an increase of \$687,222.

This is an infallible indication of returning prosperity and shows a tremendous increase in business in London.

For the week just closed the clear- ings amounted to \$869,820, against \$1,213,372. This falling off is ac- counted for by the warm weather and the rush of businessmen to the sum- mer resort.

For the week ending June 30, 1908, the clearings only totalled \$855,429, so that this week's business shows a great improvement over that of a year ago.

## THE BOYS' CAMP

Secretary Wilson Makes Final Ar-  
rangements for Annual Outing.  
General Secretary E. R. Wilson, of the Y. M. C. A., has returned from Fisher's Glen, where he was making the arrangements for the annual out- ings of Western Ontario who will camp there from July 13 to 27.

Fisher's Glen is located on the banks of Lake Erie, several miles west of Port Dover, and is an ideal spot for a boys' camp. This will be the second season of the organization, and it is expected that there will be even a larger attendance than that of last year.

In addition to the many features—baseball games, swimming, boating, tennis, mock trials and all the things that go to make up a first-class camp, they have added this year an excellent lunch which will make short excursions to various points of interest. Trips will be made to Turkey Point, Ryerson Island, Port Dover, Port Huron, East End Lighthouse and Long Point Island.

This is the largest and most thor- oughly organized camp in Canada, and one of the largest of association camps on the continent. It is so or- ganized that special care is given to the boys, there being a leader—a senior member—in charge of every six boys. The Y. M. C. A. have studied the matter of boys' camps so thor- oughly that with them it is a busi- ness, and of the hundreds of camps held from year to year there is rarely, if ever, a serious accident. A boy with such surroundings and helpful influences is more safe than a boy in the hands of his own associations.

The camp is held from July 13 to the 27th. The total expense, including travelling, room and board for the two weeks is \$10. There will be a good-sized delegation from London, and from the other towns and cities—Paris, Woodstock, St. Thomas, Stratford, Dundas, Brantford and Galt.

## MEN TO TEACH CHINESE

Anglican Churches of Ottawa Bar-  
Women Teachers.

Ottawa, June 30.—At a meeting of representatives of all the Anglican churches of the city last night, the plan was decided hereafter all Chinese in the local Anglican Sunday schools shall be taught by men instead of by lady teachers. The decision is in large measure the outcome of the re- cent atrocity in New York in connection with the murder of Miss Sling.

There is a considerable Chinese popu- lation in Ottawa, and in a number of Sunday schools there are regular Chinese classes taught by young ladies.

## MORE RAPID FIRIN

Forty Seconds for a Shot Hereafter at  
Rockcliffe.

Ottawa, June 30.—A number of im- portant changes in conditions for the Dominion Rifle Association competi- tion, which will be held at Rockcliffe, little rifle ranges from Aug. 23 to 28, were announced today by the D. R. A. secretary, Capt. R. Birdwhistell. A new time limit for shooting is provided. The time limit in which each competitor must fire a shot has been placed at 40 seconds, instead of the 45 seconds heretofore, in order to provide more rapid firing. In some of the matches new tar- gets, colored so as to represent natural surroundings, such as grass, are to be used.

Old London's Society Butterflies Are  
Becoming More Independent.

London, June 30.—The ever green and titled grandmothers who have so long held undisputed sway in society are threatened with dethronement. The revolutionaries are a galaxy of youthful and charming women who are acting the parts of great hostesses so well that the elders are trembling in the high places.

Everywhere is seen a breaking away from the old ways and the feature of the season is the number of men cha- perrons. Young girls no longer rely upon the dowagers to escort them to dances. In fact some of them actually go to and return from dances unac- companied.

If the wealthy are suffering from Lloyd George's democratic budget, there is no outward and visible sign of pain. London never looked so pros- perous or so gay. Social entertain- ments are far more numerous than last season.

This is, as usual, largely due to the ever-increasing number of American hostesses upon whom London has come to depend for amusement. Mrs. Anthony Drexel has put the finishing touches on her house in Grosvenor Square and the mansion is now one of the most perfectly appointed in town.

## BIG STEEL FREIGHTER SINKS TORONTO FERRY

### Latter Rammed as She Lay in Her Dock and Is Sent to the Bottom.

Toronto, June 30.—The steamer John Hanlan, of the Toronto Ferry Com- pany's fleet, is lying in the slip at the foot of Bay street a complete wreck as the result of a collision which oc- curred shortly after 5 o'clock this morning.

The big steel freighter, H. M. Pellatt, of the Canadian Lake and Ocean Navigation Company's line, was coming into dock at the west side of the slip, and in some way or other failed to stop. The captain is said to have dropped his anchors in an effort to avoid a collision, but the Pel- latt drove straight on, cutting right through the stern of the Hanlan and sinking her. The steel nose of the freighter then rammed the dock tear- ing it to pieces, and backed out. The Hanlan turned over and sank.

No explanation of the accident is offered by Captain Wm. Anderson of the Pellatt. The freighter came out of the collision with her bows scuffed but otherwise unharmed. Loss is about \$5,000. The John Hanlan is one of the oldest ferries in commission and was built in 1887. She was being supplied with a new hull, and was to that extent a new boat. A week ago she collided with a scow and had to have some of the planking replaced. The scow was rammed, damaging the big \$75,000 ferry Blue- bell, which was lying at the east dock.

## FOREST CITY PAVING CO. SECURED THE CONTRACT

Will Erect Wortley Road School  
for the Sum of \$11,840.

At the regular meeting of No. 2 com- mittee of the board of education yes- terday afternoon the tender of the Forest City Paving Company to do the excavating, brick and stone work, steel work and carpentering work in connection with the addition to Wort- ley road school for \$11,840, was ac- cepted.

This offer is a great deal lower than any received last week, and was unanimously accepted, as by so doing it will make the work of looking after the construction much easier for the city. The work will be under the direction of City Architect Nutter, and he will be held responsible for it.

The tenders of Smith Bros. for the plumbing was accepted last week, and yesterday the contract for the paint- ing was awarded to George Burdick at \$269. This will bring the total cost of the building very close to the \$15,000 the board estimated.

Rev. Mr. Mortimore made a short address, in which he thanked the members of the church as a whole for the reception and welcome they had given him, and gave an interesting ac- count of the work that is being done in China.

## CHINESE PIRATES ROUNDED UP

Hong Kong, June 30.—Fifty Chinese pirates were captured by the police in an unattended house at Macao after a sharp fight, in which two pirates were wounded. A number of women were included in the number captured, and several kidnapped children were recovered.

## LOST EXPLORER FOUND

Indian Agent Who Secured Big  
Grant for Chippewas.

Ottawa, June 30.—A rumor comes from the far north that George Cald- well, the explorer, who left the north years ago to make a lone-handed trip from Hudson's Bay westward to Slave Lake and down to Edmonton, and who has been given up as lost, has been reported by a native named Caldwell's brother, who lives in Ottawa, received a letter from a member of the Mounted Police force at Churchill, stating that the natives had brought in word of a well known explorer, and the story is therefore believed. If the report is correct, Caldwell is probably at Pukitukon on the mounted Police now.

## INTO THE DITCH

Twenty-five Freight Cars Piled Up  
Near North Bay.

North Bay, June 29.—A peculiar ac- cident occurred this afternoon 55 miles west of North Bay, when a fast C. P. freight eastbound left the rails and piled up at the bottom of a ten-foot embankment. The cause of the ac- cident has not been ascertained, as 500 yards of the track is torn up. Twenty-five cars, loaded with nickel, malt, but- ter, meat and miscellaneous freight, were piled up, five cars being complet- ily destroyed. Strange to say no casu- alties are reported, the train had been escaping without injury. It will take ten hours to clear the track and two hundred or more trains are stalled in consequence.

## DEATH OF DR. JONES

Indians Send News of Caldwell From  
the Far North.

Hagersville, June 29.—Dr. P. E. Jones, ex-Indian agent of the Missis- saugas of the New Credit, died here this evening. The doctor, who was a graduate of Queen's, was a noted chess player. It was chiefly through his efforts that the claims of the Chippewa Indians against the Dominion were ad- mitted.

## A POLICEMAN KILLED

One of a Coney Island Motoring Party  
Had Neck Broken.

New York, June 30.—Thomas B. McEnroe, a policeman, was killed, and four others injured, one fatally, when a borrowed automobile in which they were riding was overturned while on the way to Coney Island. George Olney borrowed the automobile from his cousin in Brooklyn and was giv- ing the other men a ride.

The car was going at full speed when a passenger stepped from the car directly in front of it. A sudden twist of the steering wheel to avoid the automobile skidding the curb, the car was overturned, and its occupants thrown out or pinned under it.

Policeman McEnroe's neck was broken, and John Brohan, another of the riders, suffered concussion of the brain and internal injuries, from which he may not recover. Three other men were painfully bruised, but Olney escaped injury and disappeared. The car was wrecked.

## STILL LIVES, THOUGH FROZEN IN LIQUID AIR

Bacteria Subject of Startling Experi-  
ments in London.

London, June 29.—Even the lowest temperature yet reached on this planet does not kill bacteria. They seem not even to be affected by being frozen in liquid air.

The life and death of bacteria were touched on by Sir James Crichton Browne when lecturing on sewage dis- posal at the international congress of applied chemistry at South Kensington.

## THE SPANISH DUNGEONS

Not as Bad as They're Painted, Ac-  
cording to the Latest Reports.

London, June 29.—Spanish prisons have so long held a reputation of being dark and fearsome dungeons that it comes as a surprise to learn that the inmates of the central prison of Madrid have been having a real good time; so much so, that Senor Saillas, the governor of the prison, has just been admonished on account of his too tolerant views on prison re- gime.

It appears that among other privi- leges enjoyed by the convicts in this model prison was that of publishing a weekly journal appropriately named Force. Copies of this were sold in the prison at one peseta (19 cents) each, but the principal source of revenue was the advertisements. Several long sentence men were allowed to keep stocks of wine, coffee, soap and play- ing-cards, which they retailed to their comrades, advertising them for sale, for instance, at Cell No. second gallery.

The minister of the interior learned the facts and suppressed the journal and prisoners' traffic in commodities.
