NEW CLUBS ADMITTED

Collingwood Curlers Raise Motion To Reduce Weight of Curling Stones From 50 to 49 Pounds.

Toronto, April 9.—The semi-annual meeting of the Ontario Curling Association was held yesterday morning at the Victoria Club, Huron street. On account of railway delays due to floods and wash-outs, a number of clubs were unrepresented, but the following members were in attendance:

The auditors' report showed receipts amounting to \$1,458.59, and expenses of \$226.64 more than that, but other funds are still due to the association.

The annual meeting was later this season than is desirable, and this was due to the delay of some clubs in filing the necessary material with the secretary.

On motion of Mr. Alex. Yule, of Hamilton, it was ordered that the annual business be proceeded with on the basis of the information received by Dec. 1, and clubs which are related will have to be left out.

The executive reported the admission of the Norwood and Stroud clubs, and the withdrawal of Brantford Heather, Chesley, New Liskeard and Simcoe, leaving 102 clubs on the roll. The regular membership is 4,383, an increase of 227.

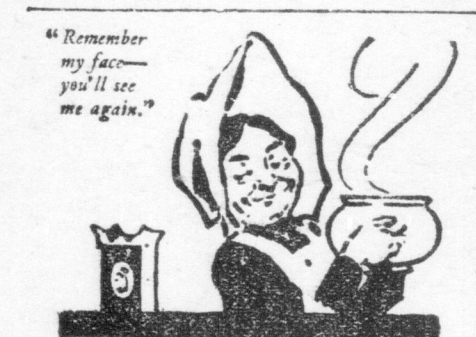
The committee recorded its regret at the loss of the late W. C. Matthews, for many years a valued member. His place on the executive was filled by the election of Mr. Hargraves.

The reference in the report to the ambiguity existing in the conditions of play for the Governor-General's trophy was followed by the following notice of motion:

That the regulations governing the Governor-General's competition be amended by adding after the third clause on p. 129 in this year's annual law following words: "When the matches are played off at one meeting the players who have represented any club in the tankard finals shall continue to represent that club without change, so long as it remains in the competition, though their position on the rink may be changed between matches."

Another notice of motion was from the Collingwood Club to reduce the maximum weight of stones from 50 to 49 pounds.

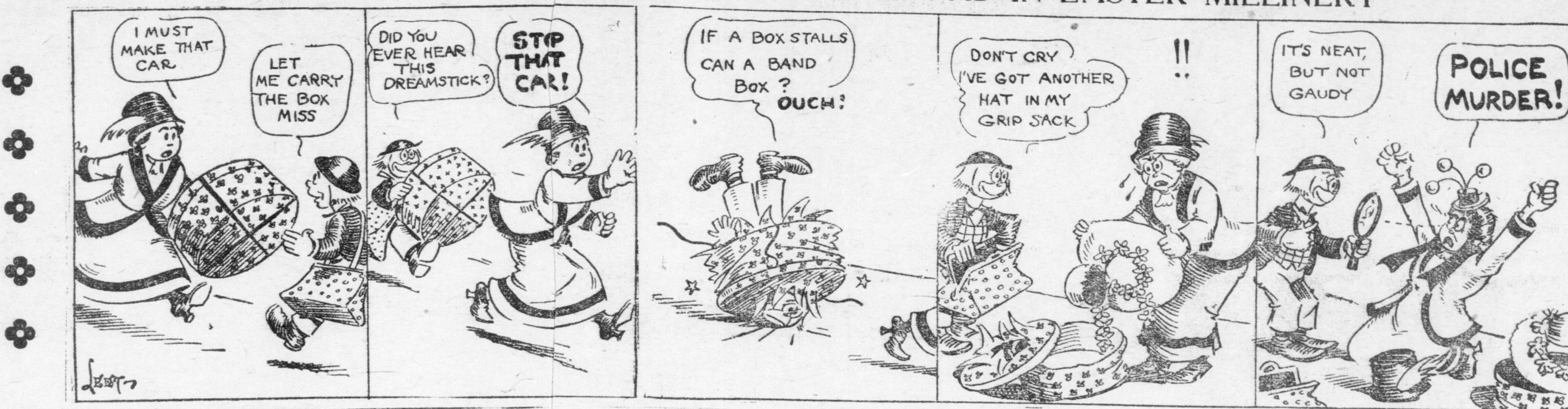

GRIPSACK SI INTRODUCES THE LATEST FAD IN EASTER MILLINERY

BIG EXCURSION FROM DETROIT
TO LONDON ON OPENING DAY

Frank Bowerman's Friends Are Planning To Run a Special Train To Give Him Reception When Canadian League Season Opens in London on May 14.

[BY JINX.] The announcement that Frank Bowerman has been signed by the London club management to manage the team this season, has created quite a sensation around the Canadian League circuit. The general opinion is that the London club showed a great deal of enterprise in landing such a well-known and popular fellow as Bowerman, while at the same time they are to be congratulated in giving the Canadian League the best boost that it has yet received. Bowerman will be the big attraction at the different ball parks on the circuit this summer, and as a result the gate receipts should swell to larger proportions than last year. The signing of Bowerman is one of the things that will convince a rather doubting public that the Canadian League is going to give the fans the very best that minor league ball can produce. Last season the different teams put up a good brand of the game, but it is not stretching it to say that this year will be good baseball all the way, and the kind that will make last year's article look like the corner-lot variety.

AN EXCURSION TO LONDON.

Another big boost for the Canadian League is the fact that Bowerman's Detroit friends, together with his friends in his home town, Romeo, and other Michigan towns, will join in running an excursion to London when the Canadian League season opens here on May 14. This was made known on Saturday last, when Ab. Somerville, one of the local directors, was in Detroit. Sheriff Burns, who is a warm personal friend of Bowerman's, informed Mr. Somerville that it was the intention of Bowerman's friends to give him a great reception on the opening day of the league, and that arrangements were being made to run a special train to this city on May 14. It is expected that about 250 to 300 will take in the excursion, and a section of the grandstand will be reserved for them.

It is rather interesting to note that in the past the excursions generally went from London to Detroit. However, the Canadian League has changed all this, and in this alone has proved one of the best things that ever happened to London. Last summer the excursions to Detroit were only half as large as in former years, and it is thought that this season they will be even poorer than last year. After all the Detroit Tigers were the magnet that attracted hundreds from this city to Detroit, but with the Canadian League putting up the kind of ball that it is expected this season, the local fans will be contented to stay at home.

BOWERMAN'S SILVER CUP.

There is an exhibition in Detroit at present a silver cup valued at \$1,500. The cup is the property of Manager Frank Bowerman, and was given to him by the New York Journal as the most popular player in the big leagues. The Journal conducted a fans' contest about two years ago, and offered prizes to the fans who could pick out the most popular player in the big leagues. The popular player was to receive a handsome silver cup valued at \$1,500. The contest lasted for weeks, and when the final ballots were counted, it was found that Frank Bowerman, who was at that time playing for Boston, had the largest number of votes. The cup was then awarded to Frank, and it has been his most valued possession ever since. It will be sent on to London in a few days, and placed on exhibition here.

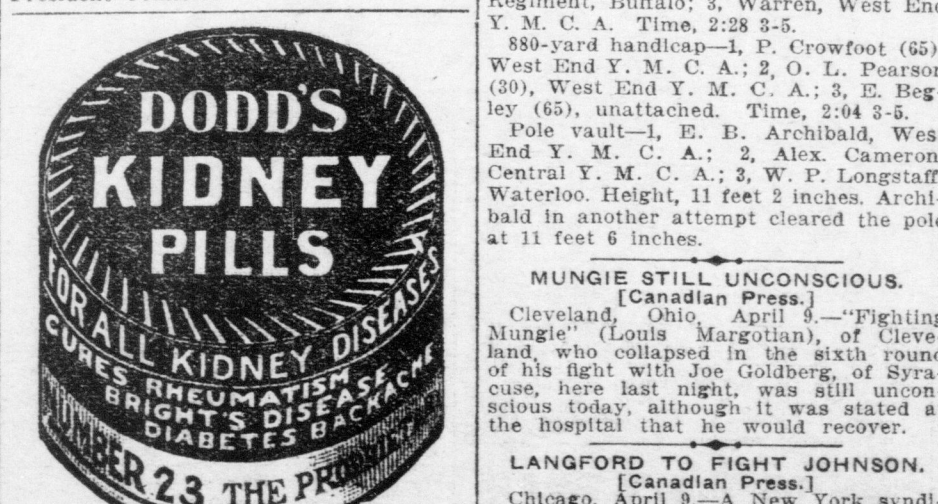
COMMERCIAL LEAGUE

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ST. THOMAS CLUB MAY PULL
OUT OF CANADIAN LEAGUE

Citizens Are Not Showing a Great Deal of Interest in Club and Men Behind It Threaten to Hand Over Franchise If Better Support Is Not Received.

T. THOMAS, April 9.—As a result of a meeting held here last evening by the local men who are interested in the St. Thomas Canadian League franchise, it will now depend upon how much support the citizens are willing to give the local Canadian League team whether or not Canadian League baseball will be played here this summer. At the meeting last week the franchise was given over to ten local men, who were to buy out Elliott's interests. These men have not backed out on the proposition, and will not take hold of it unless the citizens will come to the support of the team. A letter has been received from Chaucer Elliott, in which he makes a proposition to the local men to have him take charge of the club on June 1, after his liabilities have been met and a strong team placed in the league. This proposition did not appeal to the local men, and it is not likely that Elliott will have anything to do with a team here this year.

Will Go to Council. A deputation composed of H. P. Gough, W. K. Anderson and K. McCoy, local men interested in the club, will present the matter before the city council this evening and will ask for support. A meeting will also be held on Thursday evening, and all citizens interested in St. Thomas having a Canadian League team, are asked to be present. The meeting last evening was supposed to have been a public one, but it was very poorly attended, and the local men behind the club are rather discouraged over the whole affair. If St. Thomas is to have a team this summer, the citizens will have to show a great deal more interest than they have done lately. At Thursday night's meeting it will be decided whether or not to hand the franchise over to the Canadian League or whether to go ahead with the St. Thomas team. Very few players have been signed by the local club, and as the season is fast approaching the local men are alive to the fact that some action must be taken right away. It is thought that the city council will do something in smoothing over the difficulty, and it is not likely that Elliott will have anything to do with a team here this year.
