Answer. (a) Tuberculosis of the brain occurs in two forms, first as tuberculosis of the brain substance coverings (tuberculous meningitis). The former type is less frequent than the latter, The two forms together occur in about six or seven per cent of all cases of tuberculosis, and are more common in young people. It is usual in these cases to find tuberculous disease in other parts of the body. Tuberculous meningitis is accompanied by a swelling of the brain due to an increase of fluid, a part of the inflammatory process; this is commonly known as "water on the brain" (acute hydrocephalus), and is seen chiefly in young children.
