Having obtained an opinion from the city solicitor to the effect that every square foot of land in London is subjec an assessment for garbage tax, the city authorities, through the assessmen office, are proceeding to make such as-The public utilities commissi was made aware of this fact last night when Chairman Philip Pocock, and E. V. Buchanan, electrical engineer, appeared against paying a garbage tax of \$370 on the Horton street plant. It was explained that the Victoria Park, valued at \$251,-900, had been added to the Horton street valuation. Mr. Pocock couldn't see why the utilities commission should pay &

Other city officials, however, declared that the utilities commission is boasting of its surplus, and is producing a revenue from which it ought to pay taxes. For this reason Queen's Park, heretofore not so numerous that something could not be assessed for garbage collection, will be done to stop the nuisance. brought to the notice of the assessment board for such taxation. Including the fair buildings, the garbage tax is expected to run over \$1,000.


