RELIEF FOR JEWS

\$200,000 Given in New York—Food Ship for Palestine Wanted.

[Canadian Press.]

New York, Feb. 12.—An appropriation of \$200,000 for relief of Jewish war sufferers has been made by the American Jewish relief committee for sufferers from the war, according to an announcement made public today. The amount will be divided equally between Russian and German Poland.

They are being made to obtain a food ship for Palestine. This, so far, has proved difficult, because of the scarcity of available ships.

It is intended that the food supplies to Palestine shall be distributed regardless of race or religion, with the proviso, however, that the larger proportion is to be used for the Jewish population.

CASEMENT OFFERS BERLIN SENSATION

Irish Separatist Says British Government Conspired To Kill Him.

BERLIN, Feb. 12 (wireless to Sayville).—Sir Roger Casement, leader of the separatist faction in Ireland, published here today an open letter to Sir Edward Grey, British Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, alleging that he, Sir Roger, has documentary evidence to show that the British Government is in a criminal conspiracy to have him captured or killed, says an item given out for publication by the Overseas News Agency.

Sir Roger said that he had asked the Norwegian Government to promise him protection and that after this promise was received he would go to Christiania immediately and lay before the Government proofs of the British Minister's alleged conspiracy with a Norwegian subject on Norwegian soil.

Sir Roger's letter has been submitted to the American Ambassador and the representatives of other neutral countries for their Governments and a copy also has been directed to Secretary of State William Jennings Bryan at Washington.

CRUISER STILL AROUND.

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GERMANY PROCLAIMS POLAND INDEPENDENT

Plans Convention To Choose King, Probably Austrian Prince.

PETROGRAD (via London), Feb. 12.—11:10 p.m.—News has reached here from an apparently authentic source that Germany and Austria have declared the independence of Poland, to become operative February 14, when it is planned to hold a convention at Cracow, Galicia, for the purpose of choosing a king.

It is stated that Archduke Karl Stephen of Austria is a likely candidate for the throne.

The convention members are to be elected by ballot by the population in such parts of Poland and Galicia as are now in the possession of the Austrians and Germans. It is said, Germany has yielded German Silesia to the proposed arrangement.

40,000 GERMANS TOLL IN POLAND.

PARIS, Feb. 12.—2:51 p.m.—An official statement given out at the war office today announced the complete failure of the German offensive in Poland. The statement follows:

"The failure of recent attacks by the Germans in Poland appears to be complete. The losses of the Germans are unprecedented. It is reported that they exceeded 40,000 dead."

"Cold and the frequent use of the dense formations are among the causes given for the losses of the Germans. An eye-witness of the battle declared that machine guns mowed down the ranks of the enemy like a steel blade."

"When the combat ended the Russian saw hills of dead before them. At night, under the glare of searchlights, the undulating mass of wounded made efforts to extricate themselves. Then, towards 2 o'clock in the morning, they moved no more."

ENORMOUS LOSSES AGAIN FOR FOE.

PETROGRAD, Feb. 12.—The following official communication from the Russian general staff was made public tonight:

"On the front between the Niemen and the lower Vistula separate attacks have taken place at five points—West of Kozulowka, near Lelk; midway between Ostrolenka and Mysyniec; west of Mysyniec and in the region of Sierpiec."

"At daybreak, February 11, the Germans once more suffered enormous losses near Hill 992 in the neighborhood of Kozulowka, where they made two attacks without success."

"In the region of Lutovick and Rawa-dok our troops captured a portion of the enemy's trenches, taking 600 prisoners and three machine guns."

GERMANY CLAIMS 26,000 PRISONERS.

BERLIN, Feb. 12.—By wireless to Sayville.—"The emperor arrived on the battlefield on the East Prussian frontier. Our operations there forced the Russians rapidly to give up their positions east of the Mazurian Lakes. At some places the fighting is continuing. So far about 26,000 prisoners have been made. More than 20 guns and 20 machine guns have been taken. The amount of war material taken cannot yet be estimated."

"In Poland, on the right bank of the Vistula, the Germans continued the offensive reported yesterday. They took Siemno and made some hundreds of prisoners."

"On the left bank of the Vistula there is no change."

RUSSIANS CROWDING ON THE ENEMY.

VIENNA, Feb. 12.—10:47 p.m.—The following official communication was issued tonight:

"The situation in Russian Poland and Galicia is unchanged."

"The battle continues in the Carpathians where, despite the bitter resistance of the enemy and the Russian reinforcements coming from all directions we have progressed slowly."

"The operations in Bukovina have been successful. Our columns are advancing in the valley and the Sereth River has been reached."
