Please answer the following questions in your legal columns: I. If a party rents a house for the term of one year and signs lease to that effect, also agreeing in said lease to pay taxes on the property for 1921, removes his household effects at the end of six months, without paying for full year's rent, as lease calls for. Could he be prevented from removing his stuff, and if he removed it could he be followed in a limited time after its removal and what would the time limit be? Would the town constable be the proper person to stop its removal or to follow it if it was removed?

ANS.—No. Unless the rent was then in arrear. Your remedy is an action for damages for the breach of the lease, and upon judgment being obtained you could issue execution against his goods. If the rent is in arrear you may distrain and give your distress warrant to the constable or anyone can act as your bailiff.

Compared With Canada. Conditions in these Scandinavian countries in so far as the pulp and paper industry was concerned, were more serious than in Canada. Many of the pulp mills were shut down entirely. Some of them had taken on long-term contracts at profitable prices with mills in Great Britain and France, but had not been able to enforce these contracts. In Finland, where the currency was more

depreciated than in any other European country, except Germany and Austria, the mills were more active, especially in exporting to the United States. But the currency advantage was proving a rather dubious one, as manufacturers found the higher profits absorbed by the higher cost of necessary imports.
