

GIANTS STEAL SLUGGING SPOTLIGHT AND EVEN SERIES WITH HUGGMEN

ME RUNS COME AND PITCHERS GO QUICKLY IN FIRST FEW CANTOS

Fewster Wears Ruth's Shoes Without Pain - His Circuit Clout Good For Two Runs-Two Giant Homers Closed Up Yanks' First 3-Run Lead.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11 .- Facing the issue with the Yankees by powerful work with the stick, the Giants evened the world's series count today, taking the sixth game by the score of 8 to 5. Each club has now won three games, and if the course of the struggle so far is anything to judge by, the battle bids fair to go the limit of nine encounters, with a great contest on the last day for the final honors.


