BILL IS WITHDRAWN

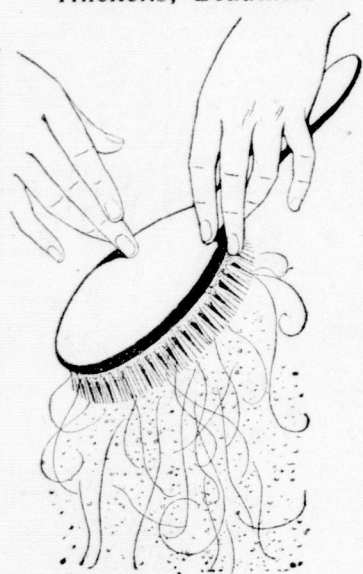
Measure Introduced by Dr. H.
A. Stevenson Planned by
Government.

TORONTO, March 24.—This afternoon's session of the Legislature was largely devoted to minor bills, although there was a considerable amount of pointed debate arising out of statements made by members speaking under special privilege before the orders of the day.

One of these debates arose out of a report published in a Toronto paper, in which one of the govern-

Elected Mayor

BRANTFORD, March 24.—Charles J. Parker, who was elected mayor of Brantford today by a majority of 1,134 votes, is a native son of the Telephone City, and one of its most enterprising and popular citizens.

ment farmer supporters were quoted as making statements which were interpreted as reflecting on the Labor members. It resulted in Premier Drury stating that the government regarded its Labor and U. F. O. supporters as equal and statements from other representatives of the government side that the two groups were united.

The premier announced that a bill would be introduced this session that would extend the scope of the municipal act in regard to married women voting in municipal elections. The bill of R. R. Hall, of Parry Sound, to force holders of unimproved lands to do two days statute labor on roads for each 100 acres owned, and which was intended to apply especially to northern sections of the province, were defeated on its second reading. The bill which would eliminate the necessity of government inspection of threshing machinery was allowed to go to committee after considerable opposition.

Will Amalgamate Offices.

A bill was introduced that will amalgamate the offices of sheriff in Toronto and York county, and another to amalgamate the registry offices of the county and city. These were government measures, and Attorney-General Raney explained that they were recommendations of the public service commission. These were the only recommendations that would be put into effect this session. The commission will continue its investigations, and other recommendations in regard to sheriffs, registrars and jail officers may be made next session, affecting other parts of the province.

Dr. H. A. Stevenson (London) moved the second reading of a bill which would amend the assessment act in order that the names of married women may be entered in the voters' lists together with those of their husbands as tenants or owners of property in municipalities, and thereby be given votes in municipal elections. However, after some discussion, the member for London withdrew the bill when Premier Drury stated that the government proposed introducing a bill along much the same lines. The government bill, the premier explained, would provide as well that where a husband had property in his name of sufficient assessment his wife should also have a vote on municipal bylaws.

MacBride Asks Explanation.
In replying to Sam Clarke, Premier Drury said that as the lowest assessment on which a man can vote on bylaws at present is \$300, the limit to give both husband and wife a vote would be \$600.

M. M. MacBride read a report of a speech made at a meeting by E. Watson (U. F. O., Victoria, North) in which the farmer was said to be a safer man in whose hands to place the reins of power than the labor man of the city who was willing to experiment with society. Mr. MacBride claimed that this was a reflection on Labor member of the house, and he wanted to know if that was the opinion of labor held by members of the cabinet. There was no answer forthcoming at first, and when Hon. Walter Rolfe, minister of labor, was particularly asked he pointed out that it was not his place to answer, but rather that of members of the U. F. O. group. The point was taken that the question was out of order in that Mr. Watson was not in the house, and he was the only member in a position to say whether or not he was correctly quoted.

H. H. Dewar and Hon. Howard Ferguson argued that Mr. MacBride was entitled to an answer from the ministry, both attacking the government for what it claimed was its desire to avoid taking responsibility for what its supporters said.

Drury Gives Answer.

"There never before was such an irresponsible government in this province," said Mr. Dewar.
Premier Drury replied that he did not think the government was called upon to take responsibilities for what one of its supporters was quoted as having said, particularly when that supporter was not present to say whether the quotation was accurate or not.

However, he had no reluctance in stating to the house that the government was loyally being supported by both Labor and Farmer members, and they were viewed as equal by the administration. The premier continued that he did not regard one class as more fitted for government than another.

The house adjourned at 6 o'clock until Monday afternoon.

A. KELLUM DIES SUDDENLY.

EXPECT REPORT
ON POLICE QUIZ

Brantford Authorities Believe
W. D. Gregory Will Issue
Statement in Day or Two.

FILE REPORT WITH RANEY

Estimate That Recent Investigation Will Cost the City
\$10,000.

BRANTFORD, March 24.—The report of Commissioner W. D. Gregory, K.C., referring to the recent police probe, is expected every day now by city hall officials. This report will be forwarded to the new mayor, who will present it to the city council. The original of the report goes to Mr. Raney in Toronto.

It has been pointed out that the investigation called for a consideration of police magistrate and police departmental matters as a whole. Any action resulting from the coming report which would affect the police magistrate would have to come from Mr. Raney's department, as the police magistrate comes directly under the provincial legal department.

The police chief and members of the force, however, come directly under the local police commission, consisting of the police magistrate, the county judge, His Honor Judge Harty and the mayor.

The only control the council has over the police commission, it was pointed out today, is to order the stoppage of all payments of money. The provincial department would then have to order a writ of mandamus, ordering the city to pay money demanded by the police commission, and such mandamus would have to be aired before a judge other than the local county judge. Although only a few accounts have so far been submitted, it is estimated in official circles that the recent probe will cost the city in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

A list of sixty-five cases will face Magistrate Blake of Galt, when he makes his debut in the police court Saturday morning. All of the cases are for alleged breaches of the Motor Vehicles Act. This will be the busiest morning since Magistrate Livingston took his leave of absence. A day or so ago Captain Bridge, police matron, was called upon to take charge of a couple of young girls who ran away from the S. A. home at Hamilton. They told that they had only been in the home for a day or so when they got home-sick for their native town, Simcoe, and so they took French leave. The police matron saw that they were safely turned over to the maternity home and left them there in a happy frame of mind.

A. J. SMALL CASE HEARD

TORONTO, March 24.—Justice Middleton's decision that the action of Thomas Flynn, claiming \$52,500 as a commission on the sale of A. J. Small's theatres, might go to trial, but not against the Small committee, composed of Mrs. Small and the Capital Trust Company, went to the second divisional court at Osgoode Hall today, and judgment was reserved. Mrs. Small was present.

VETERAN CATTLE DEALER
OF HURON COUNTY PASSES

Robert Winter Dies in His 73rd
Year at His Home in
Seaford.

SEAFORTH, March 24.—Robert Winter, the veteran cattle dealer of Huron County, passed away this forenoon at his residence, North Main street, following an illness of a few weeks, in his 73rd year. The deceased, who was born in Roxborough, Scotland, had been in business in Seaford for more than fifty years, and was well-known throughout the whole of Western Ontario. He was also one of the oldest shippers on the Toronto market.

Besides his widow he is survived by a family of two sons, Rufus in Nelson, B. C., and Robert in Goderich, and three daughters, Mrs. Wm. Ament, Seaford; Miss Hazel, of the staff of the Toronto Conservatory of Music, and Miss Frances at home. The funeral will take place from the family residence Sunday afternoon, March 26, at 2:30 p.m. Interment will be made in Matiland Bank Cemetery.

On Thursday, March 23, death removed another old and esteemed resident of the town in the person of Elizabeth "Gleichen" Carmichael, widow of the late Mr. George Whiteley. The deceased, who was 69 years of age, had been an invalid, suffering from rheumatism for a number of years.

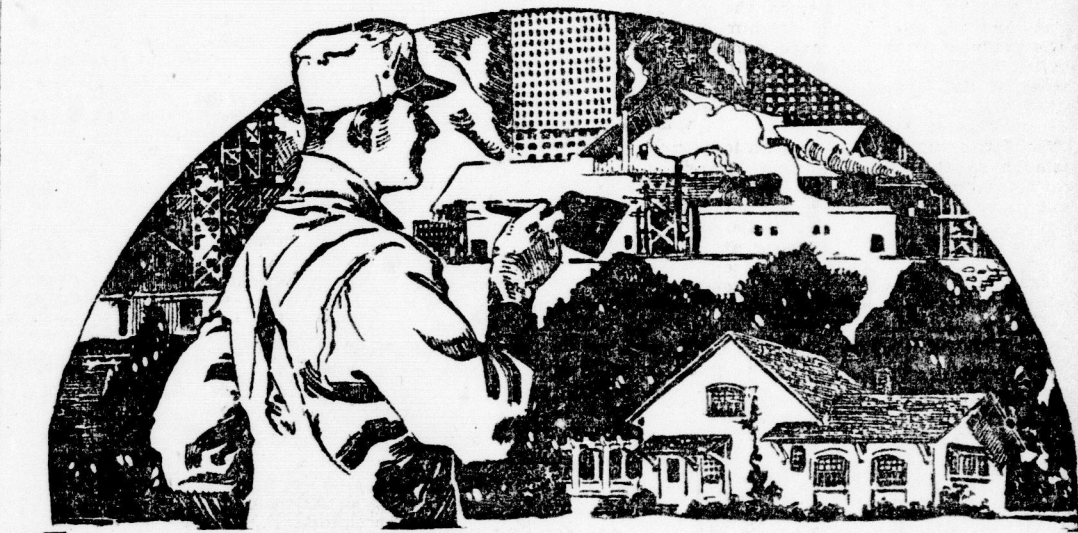
