TRAVERSE CHARGE TO NEXT ASSIZES

Judge Mowat Makes Temporary Disposition of Williams Case.

When the fall assizes resumed siting at the courthouse here Tuesday, J. C. Elliott, K.C., crown attorney, applied to Mr. Justice Mowat to have the case of murder preferred against Henry Jack Williams, now in Kingston Penitentiary, traversed to the next assizes.

Williams was taken into coustody at Melbourne in April, 1921, with Sydney and William Murrell, following robbery of the Home Bank, in which Russell Campbell, Melbourne garage proprietor was shot to death. As both the Murrell brothers escaped from the county jail one year ago the crown is not ready to proceed with the capital charge against Wil-

the chief president of the province of Brandenburg, von Achenbach, in order that I might learn about home administration, get experience in economic questions, and, moreover, take an active part in the work. Spurred on by the captivating discourses of Achenbach, I derived from this period of my life a special interest in the economic side of the inner development of the country, whereas the purely judicial side of the administration interested me to a lesser degree. Improvements, canal construction, highway building, forestry, improvement of all kinds of transportation facilities, betterment of dwellings, introduction of machines into agriculture and their cooperative development-all of these were matters with which I busied myself later on; this being especially true of hydraulic work and the development of the network of railways, particularly in the badly neglected territory of Eastern Germany. I discussed all these matters with the ministers of state after I had asended the throne. In order to spur them on, I allowed them free rein in heir various domains. But it turned out that this was hardly possible as eng as Prince Bismarck remained in office, since he reserved for himself the main deciding voice in everything, thereby impairing the independence of those working with him.
