

Ford Provides Dance Hall For "Mellie" :: Husky Dynamite Chewer Fined



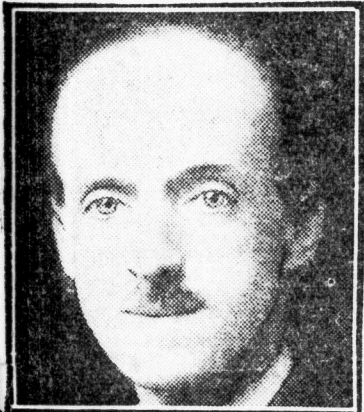

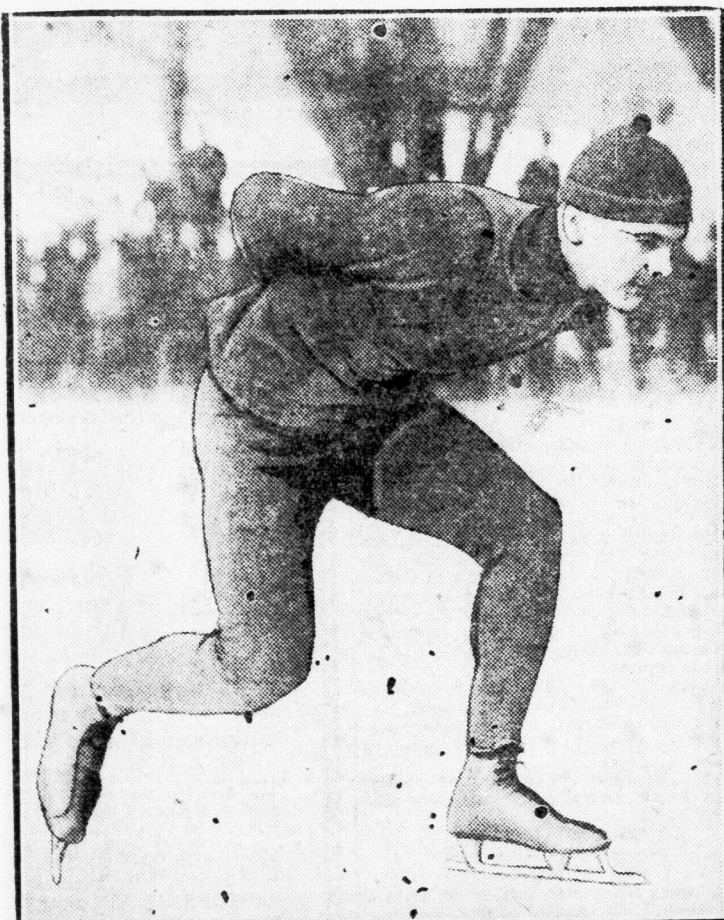
