BEFORE PARLIAMENT.

Liberal Leaders Confess to Both Houses That School Settlement Boastings Were Premature.

The National Policy Good Enough for Another Year—The Dispute With Aberdeen.

(From Our Own Correspondent.) OTTAWA, Aug. 19.—The informal ceremonies in connection with the opening of the House to-day were very brief, lasting only thirty-five minutes.

Sir Charles Tupper replied briefly, he said he did not rise for the purpose of opposing the Premier's motion, recognizing as he did the great ability of Mr. Edgar, but he desired to express his regret that the time-honored rule of electing a French speaker alternately with an English had been departed from.

Dr. Bourinot, clerk of the house, then put the motion and Mr. Edgar was elected without a dissenting voice. The newly elected speaker took the chair and thanked the house briefly for the honor conferred upon him.

In the Senate, Sir Mackenzie Bowell said, without entering into the merits of the speech from the throne, he was very much gratified to notice a paragraph in it indicating that there was a probability of the vexed question which had agitated the people of the country for the last few years, being finally settled.

Hon. Mr. Mowat said that he would take care that five years hence if a new speaker was appointed this irregularity would not occur again. (Laughter.)

Hon. Mr. Masson said that Hon. Mr. Scott had been acting as leader during the afternoon, but Mr. Mowat had assumed the duty. "He thought the house ought to know which hon. gentleman was to be the leader. There was some laughter at this remark and then the matter dropped."

The speech from the throne was finally agreed upon in council to-day. It announces that the government will not submit any legislation this session; that parliament is called with the specific object of voting the necessary supplies. During the recess the government will take up the subject of tariff reform and will invite the views of the mercantile community with the object of submitting to parliament next session a tariff for revenue only.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.—The first session of the eighth Canadian parliament has opened with all the ceremonies and military pageant customary on such occasions. The attendance in the House of Commons and Senate on the floor and in the galleries surpassed anything in recent years.

Hon. Gentlemen of the Senate, Gentlemen of the House of Commons: The necessity of making provision for the public service has compelled me to summon you together at this somewhat inconvenient season. It is impossible to lay before you this season the public accounts for the past year, or indeed any of the reports usually submitted to parliament.

The operation of the tariff will be made the subject of careful inquiry during recess with a view to the preparation of such a measure as may, without doing injustice to any interest, materially lighten the burdens of the people.

Immediate steps will be taken to effect a settlement of the Manitoba school question and I have every confidence that when parliament next assembles this important controversy will have been adjusted satisfactorily.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons: The estimates for the current year will be laid before you forthwith. I may be able to relieve you from the duty of further attendance at this session of parliament.

In the Commons the Premier moved that the speech be taken up on Friday or any other day which might suit the opposition. Sir Charles Tupper suggested Monday,

as many opposition members were away. Hon. Mr. Laurier indulged in a little rally, saying he did not wish to disturb the pleasant relations so far existing between the government and the opposition, and therefore agreed to leave the discussion over until Monday.

Sir Charles asked that all the correspondence connected with the resignation of the late ministry be laid on the table, and the Premier promised a reply to-morrow. The information Sir Charles wishes to bring out relates to the difference of opinion between Lord Aberdeen and his late advisers in reference to the filling of certain vacancies in the public service before they went out of office.

The Liberal members from British Columbia, the Northwest and Manitoba waited on Premier Laurier yesterday and discussed Western affairs, including the vacant portfolio of the interior. The result of this conference was that this portfolio will not be filled until the school question is finally disposed of and then it will go to Manitoba.
